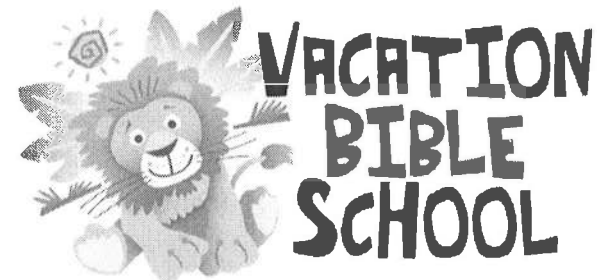

DO YOU HAVE AN OPINION? LET'S HEAR IT! ELCA FUTURE PRIORITIES AND DIRECTIONS

In anticipation of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation in 2017, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) has introduced "Called Forward Together in Christ," an initiative that invites its 3.7 million members to consider what kind of church God is calling the ELCA to become. Led by ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton and endorsed by the ELCA Church Council and in collaboration with the ELCA Conference of Bishops, the initiative asks members to join in a conversation about the future priorities of the ELCA. "We're asking all of us to think together and to talk together about what our priorities are going to be so we can be as effective as possible in bringing people the good news of Jesus Christ," said Eaton in a video message.

The initiative has three main phases: Conversations across the church about the future, consultations on the directions and priorities that emerge and decisions as a church about where the ELCA is headed. This is important work for this Church in these months and years. "We need you to be involved in the conversation," said Eaton, emphasizing the importance for all members to participate. "The more of us we can hear from, the more of us who are praying and listening to the Spirit, the more possible it will be for us to get a clearer picture and understanding of the future God is calling this church to."

Following this process, a statement of future directions and priorities will be considered by the ELCA Church Council at its November 2016 meeting. Lutheran World Relief News

The Road to Recovery after Typhoon Haiyan has been a challenging journey. On November 8, 2013, Typhoon Haiyan made landfall in the Philippines Eastern Visayas Region. The storm was one of the strongest to make landfall in recorded history.

Melanie and her children were directly affected by the typhoon. LWR's response to Melanie's community included distributing Quilts and Kits to families in need. After the distribution, LWR staff had the opportunity to check in on Melanie and her family. Melanie shared that the Mission Quilts, Baby Care Kits and Personal Care Kits were important and useful while they worked to recover from the storm, especially since she gave birth to her daughter Stella during the typhoon. She explained, "I am very, very thankful for all the things LWR has given me. They are very useful for my family. Almost all of the things like this that we had got wet during the typhoon and were covered in mud, especially our blankets and clothes." The clean, fresh baby supplies offered comfort and dignity to Melanie and Stella in an otherwise challenging time.

This is just one of the many ways the Sew-for-Missions quilts that are made at Zion have helped families in need.

This month I am again presenting a brief synopsis of a book entitled, "Enough - Discovering Joy Through Simplicity and Generosity" by Adam Hamilton. The pieces of the article that I'm sharing are taken word for word from this book. For me personally, this chapter was very meaningful. I hope it will be for you as well. Please consider purchasing the book (www.amazon.com) and reading it cover to cover.

Chapter 3 – Cultivating Contentment.

In 2007, a large area of Southern California was ravaged by wildfires, and nearly one million people were evacuated from their homes. Thousands had ten minutes to grab everything they could take from their homes and flee.

What would you take? Natural disasters remind us that everything in this world is temporary. When I'm gone, most of my stuff will be outdated, worn out, or simply of no value to anyone else – either hawked in a garage sale or thrown in the trash. This is why I can say with Jesus, "[My] life does not consist in the abundance of possessions." We say that our lives do not consist in the abundance of our possessions, but we *live* as if they do.

Restless Heart Syndrome (RHS) is much like restless leg syndrome, but in the heart or soul. We find that we are never satisfied with anything. The moment we acquire something, we scarcely take time to enjoy it before we want something else. This is the nature of RHS, and it is a syndrome that, if left unchecked, can destroy us.

James Mackintosh, the great Scottish philosopher and politician of the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries said this: "It is right to be contented with what we have, but never with what we are." In other words, it is a positive motivator to be discontent with our moral character, our spiritual life, our pursuit of holiness, our desire for justice,

and our ability to love. These are areas in which we should continue to grow and improve. The problem is that generally, we are satisfied with those things that deserve more of our time and attention.

Likewise, those things we should be content with are the very things we find ourselves hopelessly discontented with – our homes, cars, televisions, gadgets, clothes, our jobs, and sometimes our church. Clearly, we have RHS. We struggle with discontentment. So what can we do about it? I would like to suggest four ways we can cultivate contentment in the appropriate areas of our lives, followed by five ways to simplify our lives.

1. Remember that it could be worse. This is essentially the practice of looking on the bright side or finding the silver lining. It is recognizing that no matter what we may not like about a thing or person, we can always find something good to focus on if only we will choose to do so.

2. Ask yourself, "How long will this make me happy?" Rent the car of your dreams for a weekend – or that vacation home – or borrow someone else's new gadget and see what you think. Then decide if you still want to buy. Its amazing how often we change our minds when we try before we buy and stop to ask ourselves, "How long will this make me happy?"

3. Develop a grateful heart. Gratitude is essential if we are to be content. Contentment comes when we spend more time giving thanks for what we have than thinking about what's missing or wrong in our lives. We can focus on the disappointments, or we can give thanks for the blessings.

4. Ask yourself, "Where does my soul find true satisfaction?" The world answers this question by telling us that we find satisfaction in ease and luxury and comfort and money. The Bible tells us that we find our satisfaction in God alone. ... (continued)

As we've discussed previously, our restless hearts are meant to seek after God. Deep in our hearts we, too, desire to be connected with the One who is the Creator of the universe. We need to believe our lives have meaning.... there is grace and mercy when we have blown it. We need to know there is hope in the face of the darkest circumstances.... that we are loved unconditionally by Someone who knows us better than we know ourselves. And we need to be able to share this love in meaningful relationships with others. Contentment is found in our relationship with God and our relationships with other. This is why Jesus said the two most important things we must do are to "love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind" and to "love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:37,39) If we keep our focus on these two things, we will find satisfaction for our souls and lasting contentment.

In addition to cultivating contentment in our lives, we also need to cultivate simplicity. Simplicity says less is more. There comes a point when we have enough stuff, and everything above and beyond that level only creates stress. Many people are embracing the idea of voluntary simplicity. I'd like to offer five ideas that I have tried personally and found to be effective.

1. Set a tangible goal to reduce your own personal consumption and the production of waste in your life, and choose to live below your means.
2. Before making a purchase, ask yourself, "Do I really need this?" and "Why do I want this?" These questions will help you to determine your true motivation.
3. Use something up before buying something new. Always sell or donate things that still work.
4. Plan low-cost entertainment that enriches.... invite friends over. Everyone brings something.... sit around and play cards.

5. Ask yourself, "Are there major changes that would allow me to simplify my life?"

Simplifying your life requires the practice of self-control. Think about the answer to three questions: What are the long-term consequences of this action? Is there a higher good or better outcome if I use this resource of time, money, or energy in another way? Will this action honor God?

Once we ask these questions, we often find strength and help for pursuing the right course.

Which "tent" will you live in - discon-tent-ment or con-tent-ment. Choosing contentment means we look to God as our Source, giving thanks for what we have.

Thought-provoking stuff, right? Next month, we'll be looking at Chapter 4 – Defined by Generosity.

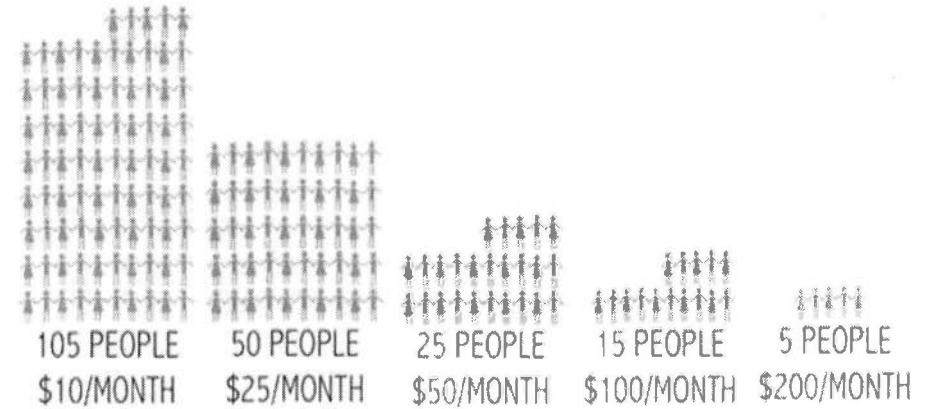

Fortune Lake Update ---

Summer Staff- I am happy to report that it is a fabulous group! I am so proud of how hard they work and how well they work together. There is a lot of teaching and training to keep us going where we need to go, but overall, they are doing a great job.

Camper Numbers- I am happy to report we have 558 campers registered as of June 21st. That is higher than we have had in 5 years! I am confident we will continue to receive more registrations throughout the summer as well. Right now the two programs that are still pretty small are our Sampler Week July 6-8 and our Family Camp Weekend July 8- 10. Please help spread the word about those programs and encourage people to come. Family camp weekend is for anyone who wants to come and enjoy camp. You do not have to come as a traditional family. We also have room music week and family camp. Family camp has reached 52 campers- higher than it has ever been!

Tree houses- The tree house project is nearing completion! There are just some clean up pieces that need to be done at this point. The county and state fire inspectors have both been through and gave their approval! Once we get the report back from the fire inspector to the county building inspector, we will have our occupancy permits! They turned out so beautiful! Chris deserves kudos for keeping that project moving along and for putting together such cool tree houses. Several of our weeks up there are completely full this summer!

I agree with Mary. Every year I'm like a little kid when I see the first sprouts emerging. God's awesomeness is quite apparent. There's a lot of promise in those sprouts!

Harvest of Hope is growing. Here's what we've planted for the community: tomato, pepper, squash, turnip, bean, pea, lettuce, carrot, beet, chard, rutabaga, radish (and probably more that I'm forgetting).

We now have four more 8x4' raised beds for a total of 12. They are in the SW corner and have tags with names on them. These beds are "owned" for the season by families or individuals who will be planting and tending them. The best news is that they are all occupied for the first time. Yay!

You're always welcome to take a stroll through the garden. We're adding signs to say what each area is and where you could give a hand removing weeds or harvesting if you get the urge. The gates are a little tricky right now but we're hoping to get them into better working order soon. We try to post on the Facebook page when we have a project coming up. We'll also announce it on Sundays but we often need to plan around the weather.

If you have questions or want to help you can call me or Michelle. Until then, I'll be playing in the dirt.

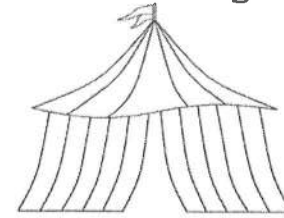
