Growing in Faith

I am very enthused about this year's Stewardship drive. For as long as I can remember, stewardship drives have always been about gathering pledges for the congregation's budget. We might talk about stewardship being about time and talent as well, and sometimes we actually make time for this emphasis, but usually time and talents takes a back seat to the pledge of financial support for the congregation. Not this year.

First of all, why do we hold stewardship drives? Some think we base the congregation's budget upon them. Rarely does that occur. Instead, we hold stewardship drives as an opportunity for people to grow in faith. Jesus promises us that where our treasure is, there is where our heart is also. (Luke 12:34) This is a wonderful promise, because if we don't like where our heart is, and we want it to change, then all we need to do is change where our treasure is. If I don't like my selfish heart, then I can move my treasure to more Godly investments and I'm promised that my heart will change. This is how we grow in faith.

Intentional, sacrificial giving is not the only way to grow in faith. It is one of many, and that is going to be our emphasis this year. Each of our Seven Marks of Discipleship are tried and true ways to grow in faith. Therefore, we are going to invite the congregation to make SEVEN pledges this year, one for each Mark of Discipleship! Each Sunday, from Sept. 11 to Oct. 23 will feature a different Mark of Discipleship.

We know that we all want to grow in faith. That growth can and does happen on its own, but it <u>really</u> happens when we are intentional about it; when we challenge ourselves to grow in certain ways; to move our treasure. This fall, through this drive, we will be challenging one another to grow in faith by making specific, growth focused commitments. How exciting is that!?!

Other Religions of the World_



God's Work. Our Hands. Sunday

God's Work. Our Hands Day is September 11th. It is an opportunity to celebrate who we are as the ELCA - one church, freed in Christ to serve and love our neighbor.

For the past few years, thousands of members from across this church have dedicated one day to serve communities in ways that share the love of God with all people.

This year we will work together with members from Bethel Lutheran and Emmanuel Lutheran in Menominee to make hygiene kits for the "iCare" ministry which will benefit both Marinette and Menominee High Schools. September 4th and 11th we will collect hygienic products such as toothbrushes, toothpaste, feminine hygiene, deodorant, soap and other toiletries, along with underwear and socks to make kits that are passed out as needed in the schools. The kits will be assembled at Bethel starting at 10:45 on the 11th. A meal will follow.



The Stewardship Corner

This is the final article from my presentation of a synopsis of the book entitled, "Enough - Discovering Joy Through Simplicity and Generosity" by Adam Hamilton. This last chapter is entitled "Overcoming Fear" and believe me when I say this, it is a powerful chapter. I hope you find it so as well.

Fear is part of the defense mechanism God has built into each of us. The brain produces a series of responses to a perceived threat, and we adapt to the threat by either fleeing from it, preparing to fight, or finding other ways to protect ourselves. But here's the dilemma we face: sometimes it is difficult to tell if something is a real threat. What's worse we tend to have overactive fear mechanisms. Sin has seemingly distorted the fear mechanism in us. Most of our fears are the result of our separation from God and the distortion of what is good in us.

If we're not careful, fear will beget fear and, at some point, the fear will outpace the reality. Adam Hamilton suggests three keys to overcoming fear.

1) Trust God

Mr. Hamilton tells the story about the twelve spies sent to the Promised Land. While those lands offered the people everything they wanted, the inhabitants were powerful and the cities fortified. Even the people were described as giants. (Numbers 13:25-33) The report was frightening. Joshua and Caleb, two of the twelve, saw the exact same things that the other ten spies had seen, but unlike the others they overcame their fear and sought to lead the people forward. They trusted God would somehow deliver them, but the people lacked faith in God and, as a result, were barred from the Promised Land and made to wander in the wilderness for forty years – all because of fear.

We have the choice to see the giants in our lives and live in fear, to pretend that the giants are not there and bury our heads in the sand, or to say, "Lord, I trust you. Bring something good from these difficult times. Guide my steps, and help me to walk with you."

2) Offer Gratitude

Several years ago two researchers, Dr. Michael McCollough of Southern Methodist University and Dr. Robert Emmons of the University of California, conducted a study on the roll of gratitude in a person's sense of well-being. They asked several hundred people to participate in a study. One group kept a journal, noting all of the events that happened each day. Another group noted only the unpleasant experiences of each day. A third group noted things that occurred each day that they were grateful for. It was the third group that showed "higher reported levels of alertness, enthusiasm, determination, optimism, and energy" and lower levels of depression and stress. They also felt more loved and were more inclined toward acts of kindness.

Mr. Hamilton challenges us to try something for one week and see what happens. Just before going to bed, as you prepare to say your bedtime prayers, take a notepad and write down five things you are thankful for from your day; then thank God for these things. Do this for seven days and see what happens as you cultivate the habit of giving thanks.

3) Live a Life of Service and Generosity to Others

The third key to overcoming fear and finding peace is to take your eyes off yourself and live a life of service and generosity to others.

Mr. Hamilton speaks of a member of his congregation, John, who at age 83 was diagnosed with a blood disorder. He tendered his resignation from leading the congregation's Habitat for Humanity ministry. John wanted to do something to serve the Lord but felt he couldn't drive a hammer any longer. Every night John continued to pray that God would use him the next day. At 2:30 a.m. John was awakened with a message, "Teach the youth construction so they can take your place in Habitat and in missions." John outlined a short construction course. Over the next two years, he offered four of these courses to their youth, training thirty-six teenagers in wiring, plumbing, drywall, and general construction so that they would do as he had done, serving God by building houses. Before he died, John took Pastor Hamilton aside and said, "Adam, the last eighteen years of this life, serving God here at the church, have been the best years of my life!" Wouldn't that be exciting — to have your last years be the best years of your life?

Something happens when we take our eyes off ourselves and choose to serve others. We "take hold of the life that truly is life." The same holds true when we practice generosity.

Yes, we are living in uncertain economic times. The key to finding peace in the midst of these times is trusting God. We are not alone. We will survive these uncertain times and see that goodwill comes through them. We must act upon our trust in God by giving thanks in all circumstances, choosing to serve others, and practicing generosity. As we begin to do these things, we will find our fear giving way to faith.

At least eleven people have been killed, tens of thousands have been rescued and even more have been evacuated as floodwaters sweep across southern Louisiana. Massive search and rescue operations are taking place as flooding continues to affect communication, overwhelm streets and highways, and damage or destroy homes. This flood comes on the heels of several other floods that have hit the Gulf Coast region, starting earlier this spring. With more rain in the forecast, the full scope of this disaster has yet to be realized.
