

Our Discipleship Together Salt of The Earth

Jesus said "You are the salt of the earth." Matthew 5:13

As someone who has lived with high blood pressure for more than 25 years, I hear this passage a little differently. At the time of Jesus, salt was a highly valuable commodity, not only for food preparation, but also for its preservation. They would be aghast if they saw how we throw it on our streets in the winter. In my life, however, its absence is more valuable than its presence. I can gain five pounds in one

night with all the salt in a large amount of pizza. And yet, even with my issues with high blood pressure, I still need a little bit of salt to live, because salt does have an important function within our bodies. We can't live without it.

We live in a world that sees little need for the light of Christ, and It is tempting to think that we can live without this light as well. Who needs love when we are filled with fear? Who needs hope when the wolf is at the door? Who needs faith when we need to protect ourselves? The light of Christ is nice when we light candles on Christmas Eve, but sometimes it's tempting to leave that light there rather than shine it in the world. After all, look at what happened to Jesus when he shined his light in the world. He was killed. And yet, he calls us to follow him; to be his light in the world; to be the salt that the earth so desperately needs.

The world is not suffering with high blood pressure because there is too much salt from us, the body of Christ. Nope. We can't overdo this kind of salt. We can underdo it, but we can't overdo it. The world needs the light that we are gifted to offer, just as we need it in our own lives. And we have plenty. God does not short us in any way with the necessary amount of light. Jesus calls us to be the pizza that the world is so hungry for. Be the light that shines in darkness of fear and injustice. Embrace your calling to be the love of God in the world, spicing it up in your unique way.

The Stewardship Corner_

It's once again time to take a look at what we, as a congregation, have done through our generous giving in 2016.

Northern Great Lakes Synod (NGLS).

Zion provided \$20,089 to NGLS in 2016. For every dollar given, fifty-one cents is used for world mission, new US mission work, seminaries and leadership, development, evangelism, worship, stewardship growth, and other ELCA missions. Thirty-seven cents of every dollar is used for the ministry of the NGLS (staff, office, and programs). Seven cents of every dollar is used for the Lutheran Campus Ministry, and five cents of every dollar is used for our seminaries and other partners.

Fortune Lake Lutheran Camp (FLLC)

In 2016, \$3,550 was used for camp scholarships and \$3,397 was used in general support of the camp. Zion provided seven full scholarships through our Community Children's Fund, and nine 25% and 50% Zion Campers' Scholarships to kids in our congregation.

DAR Boys and Girls Club

In 2016, Zion contributed \$3,653 to this outstanding organization. The DAR offers education, leadership, recreation, art, fitness and life skills' programs and activities during after-school hours and in the summer time for our area youth.

Northland Lutheran Retirement Community

In 2016, Zion contributed \$320 to this non-profit church related ministry of the ELCA. Northland provides a variety of services and housing to seniors, the elderly, and the disabled. Many in our congregation are currently utilizing the services and housing offered.

World Hunger.

In 2016, the theme was "Feed My Children" and the congregation donated \$3,212. These funds were brought to Synod Assembly and are being used to help alleviate hunger around the globe.

NEWCAP, Haven of Hope and Abundant Life MissionDonations totaling \$1,934 were provided to these three organizations. Those monies are over and above the non-perishable food donations and personal care items donated by the congregation.

Zion raised a little over \$1,400 for its **Relay for Life** team. So many in our congregation and in our families are touched by cancer. This provides another way for us to support them and cancer research.

The **Angel Tree** in the lobby had 36 names on it. Because of Zion's generosity, these children had a Christmas; something they may not have had if you had not participated.

Zion also supports the Salvation Army **School Supply Collection** directed toward needy community children. In 2016, 120 children (5 classrooms of children) were helped. The kids were provided backpacks, basic school supplies and clothing, including socks, underwear and shoes.

Equal Exchange is a Fair Trade organization that buys directly from small-scale farmer cooperatives. These sales offer the farmers a fair price for their products. Zion's congregation has supported this ministry for years by purchasing coffees, teas, and chocolate products, as well as almonds and cocoa.

Cub Scout Pack 4168 meets in Zion's Fellowship Hall. Cub master Chris Gromala and Committee Chair Alan Dewitt have helped grow the pack membership from 30 to 70 over the last 5 years. Every year, the pack evaluates itself using the BSA's Journey to Excellence program to ensure they are providing a quality and meaningful program to grade school age boys. Of the 13 criteria, the pack earned high marks in 10 of them, enough to qualify for the gold level - the highest possible. Chris Gromala's son will be moving on to Boy Scouting. We thank Chris for the leadership and service he gave to the pack. Alan Dewitt's oldest son will also become a Boy Scout this year, but his younger son just joined the pack. Alan will remain with the pack a few more years assuming the role of Cub master. Every spring the pack seeks to do some service for Zion to show their appreciation for their support of the pack. They have cleaned up and raked the front yard, which is very much appreciated.

Zion's Capital Improvement Fund. 4.5% of the monies provided to Zion's General Fund goes directly to the Capital Improvement Fund. In 2016, Zion contributed \$7,749 to this fund which was used to install a new sink in the vestry, a new counter-top in the sacristy, and to crack-fill, seal and strip our parking lot.

If you're like me, I'm sure you had no idea how far reaching our missions were and are. We do a lot in our own communities to make life better for those less fortunate, but we also reach out to our brothers and sisters all over the world. With your continued support, we will continue to "Go Where Jesus Leads" in 2017.

Fortune Lake Lutheran Camp

I'm writing this in January as we try to make our way through another ice storm. Given that, it's hard to believe that FLLC is starting to accept registrations for the summer camping season. but they are. There are a variety of camp experiences open for all age groups from kindergartener to grandparent. Costs can range from \$100 per week for On-site Day Camp to \$495 for a week of Victory Camp for mentally/physically challenged adults.

Mighty Ones launched for the first-time last summer. It provides kids who have completed 1st grade an opportunity to come to camp for two nights. This is a fantastic opportunity for your young child to experience the fun to be had at FLLC. Check it out!

FLLC has a L.I.T. program, "Leaders in Training," for highschoolers, grades 9-12, who hope someday to be counselors themselves, or just to learn skills for leadership in other situations. Several of their LITS returned to camp to help out while expanding their knowledge and experience.

Zion offers two different campership scholarships; 50% to our first-time campers, and 25% for those who previously attended. Camping at FLLC is a wonderfully rewarding experience which we hope many kids in our congregation will partake of.


Carpet Project Update
