Why Lent?

Recently I was asked, "Why Lent? Why is it so different? What should my goals be for this pilgrimage? Will I know if I have reached them?" Knowing that both of us are familiar with stage performances, this was part of my response:

Presently I'm up to my eyeballs in preparation for our every-other-year Kiwanis Kapers production. Rehearsals have begun; sets are being built; props gathered, etc. This is really a difficult time, especially with fading memory. It

causes a lot of stress and emotions run high. Think of Lent as the rehearsal time before the performance. We need the rehearsals to do what it is that we do at the performance, because it is all about the performance. As Christians, it is all about Easter. Again, it is all about Easter! This is why it takes us a full 50 days to celebrate Easter.

So, how do we prepare for the celebration? In our Ash Wed. liturgy we say that repentance, the giving of alms, and fasting are ways of preparing ourselves. Do we ever arrive, completely prepared? Nope. There will always be room for improvement – always - much like with a play. In fact, during the performance there are always moments where one wishes that s/he would have worked a little harder on a certain part to prepare a little better. I think that holds true for the way we live out the Easter message in daily life. What holds us back from giving a peak performance? Usually it can be traced to the prep work.

How will you know if/when you reached the goal? I think of one simple word: Joy. The season of Lent is meant to prepare us for the joy of Easter and sharing that joy with others. If we don't think we need Easter, which Lent tries to make us aware of, then we miss out on the joy. It is hard to accept a gift if we don't think it is a gift and we're not really looking for it in the first place.

I hope this helps. May you have a challenging Lent and a joy-filled Easter.

The Church Council met on Tuesday, March 14, 2017.

January Financial Reports

- The General Fund balance increased \$2,390 from \$8,650 to \$11,040 for the month. There were no large or unusual disbursements for the month.
- Capital Improvement Fund decreased \$477 from \$32,425 to \$31,947 for the month; transactions were donations of \$215, interest of \$8, February transfer from General Fund of \$687, and a down payment of \$1,388 to DeWitt Church Goods.
- There were no receipts for the carpet replacement project. As of February 28, the Capital Improvement Fund had no dollars and the Memorial Fund had \$1,036 designated for this project. The payment to DeWitt was treated as using the designated funds of \$500 that had been in the Capital Improvement Fund as of January 31st.
- Zion Member Camper Fund balance increased \$17 from \$5,573 to \$5,590 due to interest of \$17. Community Camper Fund increased \$305 from \$1,862 to \$2,167.
- The Sabbatical Fund received funding of \$67 from the General Fund. 2017 funding is budgeted to be \$800 or approximately \$67 per month. Current fund balance is \$744.
- The Helping Hand Fund balance increased \$196 from \$2,805 to \$3,001.

Stewardship Corner _____

Oh my gosh people; I prayed and I prayed asking God what the content of this article should be. I was beginning to wonder if my prayers were being heard. I should have known better. I started reading Chapter 5 of "*Freedom of Simplicity*" by Richard J. Foster and bam – there it was – the answer to my prayer. After reading it I thought, this chapter is all about me! Yes me, and now I share some of my thoughts with you.

All my life I've felt that if I was not busy doing something productive I was a wasted piece of skin. I suppose that feeling came from being the oldest of ten children, and living on a dairy farm (my Dad worked off the farm so a lot of the farm work fell to my dear Mom). That left me second in command to a house full of children. I'm sure you know that what we learn as children is very hard to erase.

Chapter 5 of this book asks this question; "What will set us free from this bondage to the ever-spiraling demands that are placed upon us?"

Did you ever think about all of the selves contained within you? There may be the timid self, the courageous self, the business self, the parental self, the spousal self, the civic self, the congregational self, the financial self, and the list could go on and on. Finding time for yourself and quiet contemplation in God is pretty hard. You sit down and your mind travels. You feel drawn to do something more important – more urgent. We feel frustrated with ourselves and question what could be wrong. Why do we put God on the periphery of our life?

Here is a direct quote from the author. "Earlier I spoke of God on the periphery of my life. Actually it would be more accurate to say that I was on the periphery of his life. It was I who needed to come into the Center, the Core. It is one thing for God to come into us (and a very necessary thing), but it is quite another for us to come into God. In the first instance we are still the center of attention; in the second God is the focal point. When God comes into us we still have a certain autonomy; when we come into God we have come *in*."

Speaking for myself, I know I want God to come into me, but complete surrender continues to evade me. The author asks us to seek to discover as many ways as possible to keep God constantly in mind. At the March 19th book discussion, Heidi Beland asked if we recalled the stewardship gatherings we had in private homes quite a few years ago? One of the questions asked was, how would our attitude change if God were sitting next to us in the car? I think this is what Mr. Foster is trying to have us consider.

He says, and we know, God is everywhere. Sometimes we remember that and keep in communication with him, and sometimes we become so self-absorbed we forget. Mr. Foster points out that bringing God into each activity, infuses it with divine Light. What a wonderful thought, having our daily tasks infused with the divine light of God!

So, let's discuss contentment. There are times when I have actually attained contentment. However, there more times when I don't; when I have to have that new handbag, those adorable shoes, a new color scheme in the master bathroom, and so on and so on. That is precisely the problem; as humans it seems we need just a bit more; contentment remains elusive. The author tells us that the wonderful thing about simplicity, is its ability to give us contentment. He says, "It is not necessary to always crave more. You *can* live contented with what you have, with no further desire to accumulate more."

Being content is a wonderful thing, but it can also be a double-edged sword. It could allow condoning the status quo, to give religious indorsement to present conditions. "It is sometimes the quiet counsel that the powerful enjoy giving to the poor and defenseless..... And so we are faced with the practical issue of knowing when our disquiet stems from a God-given concern to improve conditions, and when it is the result of self-serving greed."

If we want to enter into simplicity we need to order our lives. And so we are back to "silence." Here's an enjoyable quote from the book: "Please, for God's sake and our own, don't just do something; stand there!" Yes, stand there, sit there, and listen. Listen for God to speak to our heart.

We need to find a time and place to nurture silence. We need to stop the churning, to quiet the restlessness, to meditate on the almighty God who dwells in our hearts. It won't be easy, at least not for me!

We must learn our emotional limits and respect them. We can't be all things to all people. We can't cut ourselves into so many selves that we have no time for silence – no time for God except Sunday at worship, and even then the mind may wander.

The author suggests we make a record of all our activities for one month. Further, he says to rank them in the following way:
 *Absolutely essential: 1, *Important but not essential: 2, *Helpful but not necessary: 3, and *Trivial: 4.

Next, he suggests ruthlessly eliminating all of the last two categories and 20% of the first two. He says, "We are too busy only because we want to be too busy." I say, he's got that right. I daily wrestle with what he calls "existence clarification" - who I am and what my purpose for being is. I am getting better at discovering who God wants me to be and what he wants me to be about. It has taken years, and will most probably take many more.

Thinking about all of this is the hardest work we can do, but it is among the most important.

Scholarship forms for non-members are available in the lobby. Invite a neighbor or friend to enjoy our camp for free!

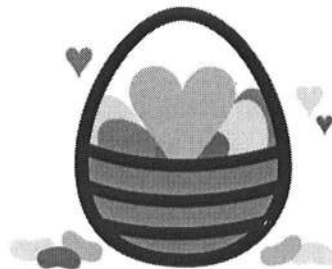

Bishop Election: You Can Participate!

The Northern Great Lakes Synod of the ELCA will be electing a new bishop at its Assembly, May 21-23. A transition team was set up by our Synod Council to guide the process toward election. They have decided to create an opportunity for possible candidates to be pre-identified before the Assembly. Potential candidates are limited to any E.L.C.A. pastor, whether that person is serving in our Synod or not.

The members of the Northern Great Lakes Synod, which includes you, are invited to identify clergy that they think would be good for the job. They can do so from April 1 – 15 by going to the Synod's website, www.nglsynod.org, and filling out an Identification Form. The individual that you identify will be contacted by a member of the Transition Team to see if that person wishes to continue in the process. If the individual agrees to proceed, he or she will be invited to fill out the Biographical Information Form. Information about all those agreeing to be a part of the process will be posted on the Synod's website on May 1.

Being pre-identified does not necessarily mean that these pastors will be on the first ballot because the first ballot is an open ballot, meaning that the delegates are free to put down one name of any ELCA pastor onto that ballot. They are not limited to those who were pre-identified. In other words, being pre-identified is not a nomination. That happens officially on the first ballot.

So, if you desire to have a voice in the process of electing our next bishop, you are welcome to do so between April 1-15, by going to the Synod's website. While you are there, you will also have access to a Self-Study Report that the ELCA created in February describing the issues and challenges presently facing our Synod. This Self Study will inform the dialogue surrounding the election.

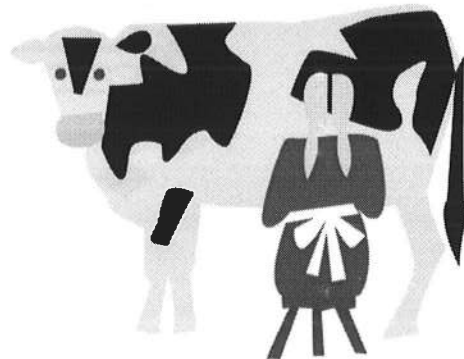
World Hunger Drive_____
