### Let The Party Begin!

“As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love.” *John 15:9*

It is complete, absolute, sacrificial, unconditional, and unfathomable love that Jesus has loved us with. It totally surrounds us. It permeates our lives. As the Apostle Paul says in the eighth chapter of his letter to the Romans, nothing in

the heavens or in all of creation can separate us from that love; not even our bad decisions; not even our willful neglect; not even our terrible mistakes. Nothing can separate us from that love.

With this in mind, I think Jesus’ command is interesting. Jesus says, “Abide in my love.” In other words, “live in my love,” or “dwell in my love,” or “make your home in my love.” In light of the complete, permeating, surrounding love with which we are loved, I need to ask, how can we do anything but abide in that love?!? It’s not as if we can separate ourselves from it.

The Prodigal Son thought that he killed the love of his father by telling him to drop dead, taking his half of the inheritance and running away. He was all prepared to do what was necessary to live as a slave under his father when he came back, but the father’s love was not dead. It was alive and ready to welcome him home long before one word came out of the son’s mouth.

Maybe that’s the point. We can’t ever separate ourselves from the love of God, no matter what, but we can and do try to run away from it every day. We try to deny it. We try to ignore it. However, when we abide in it, we discover that the father isn’t a slave driver, but loves to throw parties for his children. Easter is one of those parties, and it lasts 50 days! What a joy to abide in that kind of love!

## Council Meeting Summary \_\_\_\_\_

February attendance was up from 2012 from 117 to 121. Attendance for Ash Wednesday was also up from 2012 from 79 to 90.

The General Fund/Parsonage combined fund balances as reported increased \$1,857 because the February \$2,151 World Hunger donations received are being held. The Capital Campaign Fund balance decreased \$1,260 to \$23, 185. The Capital Improvement Fund Balance increased \$220 to \$34,375. The Thrivent loan balance was \$31,757 after the 02/15/13 payment and the \$3,212 principal payment at the end of February. The loan will be less than \$30,000 at the end of March.

The Evangelism Committee is working on revisions to the cry room, checking into round tables for the fellowship hall, considering setting up babysitting services for the congregation, and will be working with Pastor on the new Sunday evening service.

The Stewardship Committee has delivered all of the Time & Talents booklets. The sheets that have been returned will be entered into Shepherd's Staff shortly.

The Council is taking a close look at all of Zion's standing committees. Three are currently struggling; Christian Education, Fellowship, and Property, while the rest are reasonably active. The Property Committee will be reorganizing into something which will provide not only comrodery for the participants, but keep Zion in good repair.

The Council decided to offer Dave Ramsey's Financial Peace University at Zion as soon as practical. The Council had been encouraged to view the program video on the website and was very impressed with the message presented.

FLLC camp application forms will be distributed to DAR, Zion members and the Cub Scout troop which meets at Zion. The forms need to be back in by April 14<sup>th</sup>.

On recommendation by Karen Houdek, Zion's Financial Secretary, the Council agreed to send out financial reports twice a year rather than quarterly.

Pastor announced that Bishop Tom Skrenes will be visiting and preaching at Zion on April 28.

The next Council meeting will be April 15, 2013 at 6:30pm.

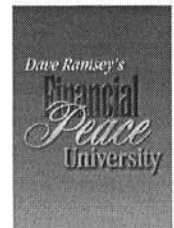

## Harvest of Hope Community Garden

The garden team had a meeting on Monday March 25th.

We discussed this year's layout which includes adding 8 raised beds and perennial sections along the fence. The fence sections will have asparagus, rhubarb, strawberries, raspberries and an herb garden. Some of the raised beds will be allocated to kids and will be set up for square foot gardening. Each child will have their own square (or 2) where they will be able to plant seeds and watch them grow. All of the grass inside the fenced area will be removed and wood chips will be put in the main walkways. Plans for a garden shed and benches were discussed. Some other things that we are still working on include installing a point and coming up with some sort of bulletin board/information area. This will allow better communication about what needs to be done, what has been done, what produce has been picked, where it went and how much there was. We do have some flower sections left available around the outside of the fence if anyone wants one.

The Evangelism Committee met March 18, 2013

We anticipate the new signs being donated by Pam and Rob Lund owners of Shooby's Trophies and Apparel will be installed before Easter Sunday. After having the Memorial Service for Diane Tipple we realized just how much these signs are needed. In addition, Bryan Krah is putting together a schematic based on Zion's blueprints which will be used for another type of sign which will help to assist visitors in knowing the layout of Zion. It is our hope that these signs will make all visitors feel welcome and more comfortable in navigating through Zion's building.

The Committee is slowly starting to renovate the Cry Room in order to make it user friendly for small children and their parents. The walls will be painted in brighter colors and pictures taken from the SPARK Children's Bible will be framed and hung. Stephanie Klein has donated small storage bins and a car carpet. The Committee hopes to find a bright colored area rug to define a "play" area, a smaller kitchen play center with plastic food, and a small child size table and 4 chairs which will be used for coloring or snacks.

We are also looking at how to allow easier communication between people when we have Coffee Hour or at our new Sunday evening worship service. We hope to find used large round tables which will be free or nearly free.

Kathy Heimbuch is interested in pursuing a new program called "Parents Night Out" which would provide free babysitting services to young couples at Zion on a Friday night. The committee will be discussing this at our next meeting in more detail.

The Evangelism Committee will also be working closely with Pastor Keith regarding the Sunday night worship service which we want to implement in the very near future. This service will feature a conversational style similar to our Lenten Prayer Journey.

## The Stewardship Corner \_\_\_\_\_

Last fall we sponsored Cottage Gatherings specifically to uncover how God works within us in daily life. Those gatherings were so interesting I wanted to carry that theme forward. I know it's hard to think that what we do daily is God's work or call; I have a hard time wrapping my mind around that thought as well. But I'm told that is the case, and so I thought I'd ask a few people to discuss their sense of calling. Here's what they had to say.

I spoke with Linda Forray, our intern and asked her when she heard God calling her to ordained ministry. She told me that God had been egging her on for some time. She attended Lay School for Mission classes and graduated in 2009. Convinced she had to learn more, she spoke with the former Assistant to the Bishop, Jennie Johnson-Wrege, and together they decided Linda's next step. Linda told me she always put her call in God's hands. She more or less made a deal with him; she'd go to the next thing and if he'd carry her through she'd continue on. Each step God kept his part of the bargain until she finally realized this is what God wills for her. She never conceived that she would be a minister, but here she is, well on her way, with God carrying her through.

I also spoke with Pastor Keith who first heard the call to ordained ministry in high school, and pretty much submitted to it at that point. He said there was a discernment process that continued through college and seminary, and really continues to this day. But, he was pretty committed from the time he first felt the call right up until he was finally ordained. His freshman year in college he asked to live on the floor that most of the pre-seminary students lived on. And his freshman year of college he took Biblical Greek, which was typically a junior or senior level course. He also took a J-term independent study that year where he followed his pastors around for a month and preached, etc. He says he was pretty committed right out of the gate.

Certainly, the majority of us are not called to be ordained ministers, but we are called none the less. 1 Corinthians 1:9 reads: "God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord."

God has placed within each of us gifts that he wants us to utilize in his name. A love of numbers, music, healing, teaching, and the list goes on and on. But, do we recognize what we do with those gifts as being God's call to us? Many times we don't until we're asked to think about it. I hope this series of articles helps us to think about it.

Karen Kolstad said that when Pastor Keith was called to Zion in 1998 she had to leave her job as the office manager of our Northern Great Lakes Synod office in Marquette, MI. Karen thoroughly enjoyed working there and felt it was a calling. She questioned how she was ever going to find another "job" to which she felt as called.

After their move, she took some time off to be at home, as Jake and Jacki had a difficult time with the move. During the first few months of 1999, she began looking for a new job and prayed that God would lead her to something that was not only fulfilling for her but also used the gifts God had given her. Several parishioners at Zion were wonderful and would call her occasionally with possible job opportunities. Larry Nelson called one day in April and said that the trust department at Stephenson National Bank & Trust had an opening and he felt that she would really enjoy working with the people there. Karen thought she'd give it a try, and she got the job! Trust work was a whole new world, but as she became more familiar with it, she realized it was a perfect fit for using her gifts! She feels she has been blessed with good math skills, administrative skills and people skills. The work she does in the trust department combines all three of these areas in a very unique way.

Karen says it is such a blessing to her to feel that she can make a difference in peoples' lives every day. She and Pastor Keith thank God often for the opportunities they have to serve the people of our area, both at Zion Lutheran Church and at Stephenson National Bank & Trust!

Ann Buscher felt called by God to work with special needs kids while she was teaching music at the elementary school level. That calling has evolved into working with adults with special needs through the Ecumenical Bible Class. She started helping out, and now runs programming for the group. Ann asked Carole Boerner if she would be interested in helping out. Carole says she enjoys working with the group, finding the "kids" to be fun, amazing, smart adults, knowing things you'd never imagine, and always amazing her. Ann says, of all the things she does, this would be the one that she'd be unwilling to give up, because she really feels called to this. (Kathy Heimbuch works with this group too, and has a separate article in this newsletter that you'll want to read.)

Michelle LaFond chose nursing as her career path because it would allow her to raise her son as a single mom; it offered flexibility and good pay. She says she didn't feel she had a calling into nursing, but once she started working as a nurse in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit and saw what the premature babies go through and the difficult struggles that the families have, she questioned if man wasn't playing God.

About four years into her nursing career, she really struggled with this "man playing God concept." She questioned if this was where she was supposed to be. Then in 1996, one little girl really turned her thoughts around. Amber was born in January, 1996, and she stayed in the hospital until September. Michelle saw first hand how Amber fought to live over the course of that time; she felt like they were torturing that poor baby. But Michelle saw Amber years later. She saw the beautiful little girl that she had become and the joy that

It was then that Michelle realized they weren't playing God, but rather God had provided her with the gifts that were needed to do his work. Ultimately, life is in God's control, and Michelle was given a gift to care and nurture these premature babies in whatever time they are given. Whether they are with their parents or they go to Heaven, either way she has been given the tools she needs to support them.

She always treats these children as God's children. When it starts to be a job, she feels it will be time for her to step aside. Even though she didn't realize it at the time, now Michelle knows that this was indeed her calling and that she is right where God intends her to be. Now each day, her focus at work is to provide care as God's work. Everything she does, everything she says, every way in which she does her work is a reflection of what God wants her to do- to show his love and his care. There's a sign on her floor that reads: "Every day holds the possibility of a miracle." That's the truth – she gets to see a lot of miracles in her work.

Next month I'll continue to explore how God's work is being done by members of our congregation. It's gratifying when we can recognize and support all that people do as the church in daily life. I hope it helps us think about what we do in a different way, as God's call to us. That's my goal!

It's fun to watch the child-like wonder of things they're doing, while trying so hard to be grown ups. That's why when I had a chance to help out with the Ecumenical Bible Class for adults with special needs I jumped at it.

There are over 40 of them who come together every other Tuesday. They learn about the Bible from a guest speaker (and believe me they know more about it than most of us), do a craft for area nursing homes, and play games; once a year we have a karaoke night which brings tear to my eyes. They also play bells (of which they're very proud) and travel around to different churches, nursing homes, and organizations.

We can always use more volunteers, as some of them struggle more than others. We meet at St. Paul's Episcopal Church on the first and third Mondays of the month from 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. Please become a volunteer, because once you do you'll fall in love and find out what a joy it is to work them.

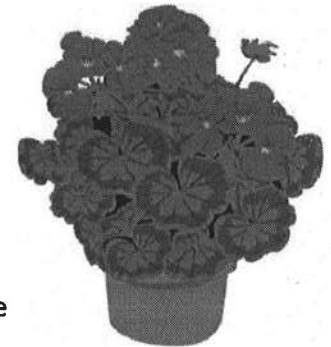
