



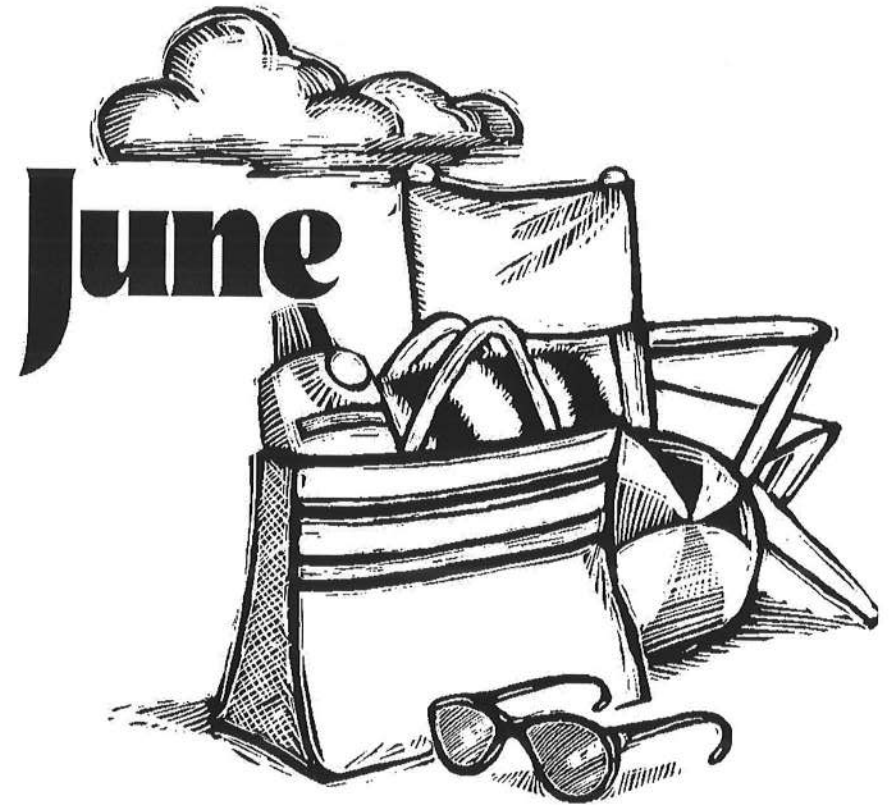

Time to Garden

The weather is almost warming up. The days are getting long. The trees are bearing their leaves. It's time to get gardening!

Council Meeting Summary

April attendance was down significantly from 2012 from 160 to 129. The average for March and April was 135 which was similar to last year. There were two baptisms: Ayden Henry and Lily Madisen Behnke on April 28, and a funeral on April 19 for Don Race. Pastor shared his vacation dates: May 20-25, June 15-22, July 15-20, and August 26 to September 2.

Linda finished 2 Lay School classes and will be attending the Synod Assembly on May 16-18. She will assist with opening Communion and will present a workshop there as well. She will be taking vacation from July 7-13 and selected Mondays.

General Fund/Parsonage combined fund balances as reported decreased \$8,346. \$4,660 was remitted to Synod for Buck-a-Chick. The Capital Campaign Fund balance decreased \$1,260 from \$21,925 to \$20,665. The Memorial Fund had receipts of \$510 and no disbursements. Fund balance consists of \$6,360 of co-mingled funds plus \$8,695 in the Thrivent money market fund.

The Evangelism Committee reported that "Mom's night out" involved 3 families and a total of 7 children. Five teens assisted. Additional times will be planned, and a "Dad's night out" will be considered for June 14.

The Property Committee met last week, continued clean-up projects, and began trimming.

The Stewardship Committee attended a Chick Lane (pastor and author) seminar in April. Key ideas: every single thing belongs to God and we are managers; stewardship should be year-around; congregations don't just "pay the bills", they connect faith and finances in their lives - we give because that's what Jesus' followers do.

The Personnel Committee reported that Fran Lebeck retired last week. Council agreed to follow their suggestion that his work be divided among 3 people. There is a cost savings as it would take the same amount of time but pay would be minimum wage. Currently, mowing will be done by volunteer members of the congregation, the Git-R-Done group is doing basic maintenance and purchasing supplies, and meeting set-up is done by volunteers.

The Harvest of Hope Community Garden Committee noted that the well is finished and work is being done on additional raised boxes. Grant money from the M&M Community Foundation was used to cover the cost of the well and will be used for a shed.

Pastor Keith and Karen Kolstad (Assembly secretary), Jacki, Kathy, and Linda (seminarian) will attend Synod Assembly on May 16-18.

There are five recipients for the FLLC Scholarships: Madylinn Sims, Sami Amory, Olivia Baxa, Austin Guns, and Brooklyn Guns. All are friends of members of Zion.

The cost of the kits for the Financial Peace University is raising from \$89 to \$95. There is a deal now to buy 10 and get 2 free with shipping included. Council agreed to purchase the 10 kits for future classes.

The Council approved the Evangelism Committee's proposal for the new Sunday Evening Service of Reflection. They will be held at 5 p.m. in the Social Hall. A trial service is set for June 23. The Synod offers evangelism grants and Zion may be able to obtain one for advertising costs. Pastor Keith shared that Bishop Skrenes was very excited about this new service.

The Council approved sending the old hymnals to the English congregation in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania and covering the shipping costs. Their choir will be at the Synod Convention and could take them back as extra baggage.

On recommendation of the Property Committee, the Council approved purchasing 6 lights for Zion's sign and bell tower. Scott Williams and his company would donate time and the equipment for installation.

The next Council meeting will be June 11, 2013 at 6:30pm.

The Stewardship Corner _____

I recently read an email about the word “vocation” stemming from the Latin word *vocare*, “to call.” It means the calling of God to all Christians (and, some would say, all people) to participate in the care of the world and people God loves so much. When we speak the word vocation we most probably refer to how someone earns a living, but it is more than that. It’s about the relationships we forge with the people we encounter day in and day out while we do what we’re doing. It doesn’t matter if we’re paid or we volunteer. It doesn’t matter if we are students or parents. What is essential to the call God gives each us is to care about those people God brings into our lives.

For the last two months, we have been looking at how God calls each of us and how it relates to caring about the people that God brings into our lives. This article concludes the series.

Stephanie Klein asks, “Have you ever been paid a compliment that you knew you were not deserving of.” She says her parents always taught her to graciously accept compliments with a “thank you” even if she felt she didn’t deserve it. Stephanie says, “When Karen Sylvester asked me to share why I know I am following God’s calling, all I could ask was, Why me?” Karen replied, “I think you deserve the *Mother of the Year* award!” With that Stephanie replied, “Thank you;” however, she felt her response should have to be, “I’m not and I don’t.” Stephanie definitely does not consider herself *Mother of the Year* material. She has her moments where she loses control and lets Jesus take over! Furthermore, she’s not entirely sure that she’s following the path that God is calling her on. What she does know is that what she is doing feels right.

When she wakes up in the morning she thinks, “How can I touch the lives of my children today?” But the thing is – they are the ones touching her life! She lays the foundation of good morals, values, and manners and the kids follow her lead. Sure, she throws some bubbles,

finger paint, and play dough in there to make it fun, but it’s all a learning process. Being a parent is a scary thing, probably the scariest thing she has ever done. She questions, “What if I do it wrong? What if something happens, or God forbid, what if they end up getting into trouble?” Is that a reflection on her parenting? Will her “*Mother of the Year Award*” be stripped away from her? She doesn’t know, but what she does know is that with God’s love guiding her she is doing what feels right to her.

Bill Walker recently drove a point for Zion’s Harvest of Hope Community Garden. I was astounded to see him out at the garden working away given the fact that he is 91 years old. I thought to myself, “My goodness this man is so caring and willing to give of himself so freely; I really need to talk with him,” and so I did.

Bill worked for 38 years at Scott Paper Company and he tells me finding water started out as a hobby for him around 1950. That’s when he discovered a pipe sticking out of the ground in his own backyard which turned out to be an abandoned well pipe. It was soon after that when Bill decided he wanted to have a water system for his garden, but he couldn’t find any water so he called in a co-worker who said he could find water for him. The co-worker came with his willow branch with a fork and he started the search. When the stick went down toward the ground, (this is called witching), Bill marked the spot and started to drive his point. Bill told me the art of witching has evaded him all of his life and he still has to call his friend in to help. One thing led to another and pretty soon Bill was getting calls to service a lot of wells, work on water pumps, and drive new points for people all over the area. He developed his own machine to drive the points, and his own system for pulling them as well, and that machine and system is what Bill used at Zion. Michelle Larson helped Bill drive our point, and he wanted me to let everyone know what a joy she was to work with and how much he appreciated her help. So, thank you, Michelle!!

Bill feels truly blessed to have been provided the opportunity to learn about witching and driving wells. It has allowed him to work with his hands, something he couldn't do at his day-to-day job. It brings him great joy, especially from the people for whom he drives these well points; there is no greater blessing than having water near at hand.

Even now, he continues to actively do this work, and he still feels really good about doing something for someone that proves to be so very worthwhile. Bill told me there are many times when he has asked God for help to solve a water problem, and he always receives a solution.

Even though Bill is 91 years old, God is still busy leading him. He has been involved with the Ecumenical Bible Class for the developmentally disabled for over 30 years and they truly are his extended family. He derives such joy from working with all of them. When I started working at Marinette County in 1979, Bill served on the County Board as he still does today. I absolutely marvel at this man. I truly admire his ability to continue to give himself away and the love he spreads as he does it.

When I started this series of articles, I didn't see much of what I was doing with my life as a call from God. I have since changed my mind. A couple of years ago, I asked Pastor Keith to pray for me. I wanted insight into what it was that God wanted me to do and I felt I could use the extra prayer. I knew God had saved me from Ovarian Cancer for some reason, and I wanted to be sure I was about whatever it was he wanted me to do. I had already felt a call to Zion's Stewardship Committee, but I knew there was something more, but what? So, Pastor and I prayed, and that prayer led to my attending Lay School for Mission. It also showed me that I needed to be involved in evangelism.

Out of all the things I could involve myself in at Zion, stewardship and evangelism were the two things I never ever would have wanted to be involved in. But it's funny how God's Holy Spirit works; the spirit cast away my doubts about these two topics and fears about my abilities. Through the Holy Spirit's leading I have truly changed my perception of stewardship and evangelism.

I hope this series of articles has changed your perceptions as well. God has and is calling us, and he will lead us as well if we let him. Isn't it wonderful to know that God is with us always and loves us deeply? Until next month.....

Yes, we are going divide up Zion’s custodian position into four individual positions, (and this doesn’t include the maintenance and repair work being done by the Git-R-Done Group!) We are doing this in order to create greater efficiency and flexibility, as well as to incur some cost savings.

We will be filling the mowing position with “volunteers” that we will thank with \$50.00 each time the mowing is done.

We already have a person who will focus on cleaning the bathrooms and removing trash.

We still need to fill two more positions. Both of these positions will be paid minimum wage.

1) Worship area – We are seeking a person who will spend 4 hours a week taking care of the worship area of the building. Duties will include vacuuming, dusting, candle maintenance, cleaning glass and general tidiness of the area.

2) Education/Office area – We are seeking a person who will spend 3 hours a week taking care of the office and education side of the building. Duties will include vacuuming, dusting, cleaning glass, sweeping, mopping and general tidiness of the area.
