“Be Thankful!”

Can we legislate thankfulness? Is it possible to create laws that will make us more thankful? Like the child obeying the parent, saying thanks to Aunt Edna for her gift of hot itchy socks, the words might be there, but the heart isn't in it. Is it possible to make the child thankful for those hot itchy socks by demanding the expression of thanks? A thankful heart is like a loving heart. It cannot be forced. It cannot be legislated.

And yet, we hear Jesus say/legislate that we are to love one another as he has loved us. And, after healing ten lepers, he points out the noteworthiness that one came back to give thanks. There is an expectation that we who follow Jesus are to live loving and thankful lives. But can this be legislated?

It is noteworthy that President Lincoln, who legislated Thanksgiving Day in 1863, did not say “Be more thankful” in his famous Proclamation. Instead, in the midst of the Civil War, Lincoln said “notice” in a number of ways within this Proclamation. In a way he said, “Notice God’s hand within another bountiful harvest. Notice God’s hand within the maintenance of peace and order. Notice God’s hand within our industry and growth as a nation.” Citing numerous examples, Lincoln said, “notice these things,” and then assumed the giving of heartfelt thanks would take care of itself.

So, we who follow Jesus, may not always have gratitude on our hearts, but we fall into routines, even legislated routines, that force us to notice, and out of it we discover heartfelt thanks upon our lips. We mumble through prayers at mealtime or bedtime, or we challenge ourselves to notice three things within the day that just passed for which we can be grateful, and from it we will witness the growth of gratitude. Yes, even one legislated day a year

for giving thanks can produce thankfulness if the focus is upon noticing all that there is for which to give thanks.

So, let us embrace this legislated day for giving thanks. Let us use it to notice the loving and gracious activity of God within our lives, our families and our communities. Let us even notice or discover things to be thankful for within the struggles and disappointments of the past year. Let us be a people who are on the lookout for wild and crazy things to be thankful for, like hot itchy socks, signs of God's affection and kindness. And then watch as gratitude does miraculously bubble up in our hearts with praise and thanksgiving to God as we fall deeper in love with the God who is so absolutely in love with each and every one of us.

“Praise God from whom all blessings flow.
Praise God all people here below.
Praise God above ye heavenly host.
Praise Father, Son and Holy Ghost.”

Congregation Council Highlights

The Congregation Council met via Zoom on October 12th beginning at 6:30 p.m. After the opening devotions, Norah Derby and Owen Derby gave their faith statements to the Council. Upon completion of their faith statements the Council unanimously accepted them as confirmed members of Zion. Their confirmation will take place on Sunday, October 31st.

Pastor Keith noted that attendance declined once again during September. He did a graveside service for Georgianna Veriha on September 11th. Pastor also reported that the Red Cross was very pleased with the drive that took place in our building on September 30 and requested two more dates to hold drives during 2022. Pastor will be on vacation for a week in November and a Sunday in December.

In the financial reports it was noted that there was a substantial decrease in the General Fund balance during September due to the insurance payment and Shepherd's Staff annual fee. The decrease so far in the Fund for the year is \$9,242. This balance may improve as we get closer to Christmas and the end of the year.

We are still working with the ELCA Endowment Fund over a disagreement regarding the amount deposited in that fund recently. Thanks to a donation from a member, Pane to Clean was hired to clean the brick and windows on the exterior of the church building. The work done greatly improved the look of the building in many areas. The bushes between the chapel and the garden will be trimmed back because they are on top of the roof and will cause damage. Snow removal for the upcoming winter was discussed.

Three young people are set to attend the ELCA Youth Gathering this summer.

The Stewardship and Generosity Committee is planning a fall drive.

Outdoor worship services will conclude at the end of October. Holy Communion will then be offered weekly at each of the indoor, in-person services. There will be no changes to the safety protocol of the indoor services at this time.

The Faithful Innovations team reported on work they have been doing since their last Synod training session. They would like to develop a social media committee that would look at all of Zion's social media presence and would also guide an expansion into TikTok. Pastor Keith showed a TikTok video to the Council that he created and there was significant discussion regarding this video and TikTok.

The Council reviewed disposal options for the Kurzweil piano. Significant discussion took place over a request for funding from Marinette High School. Due to the lack of a formal request, further discussion was tabled until one is received. During the month of January, there will be a food drive under the title of "Souper Bowl" in which we will collect food for school needs as well as NEWCAP.

There was no new business.

The meeting adjourned at approximately 8:10 p.m. The next meeting of the Congregation Council will be held November 9th.



Tolling of the Funeral Bell: Remembering those Who Have Died of COVID-19

Sunday, November 7, 2021 at 12 noon.

At this time last year, just over 200,000 people had died of COVID-19 and along with our fellow congregations throughout our Synod as well as other denominations, we rang our church bell to honor their memory. This year, that number has climbed above 700,000 (as per CDC and WHO). Each death represents a grieving family, a loss suffered, the absence of a loved one felt. Sunday, November 7 is All Saints Sunday. It is a day that we remember our beloved dead. Again, on this day, we will also remember the many who have died during this pandemic by tolling our bell for five minutes at 12 noon on All Saints Sunday, November 7. Our Roman Catholic, Episcopal, and Methodist siblings, in addition to all community churches, are also invited to remember the dead in this way.

The goal of Zion's Stewardship and Generosity Committee is to help God's people grow in their relationship with Jesus through the use of the time, talents, and finances God has entrusted to them.

Do you sometimes drive down the street and spot a beautiful home and wish yours looked as good? Do you watch HGTV as I do and wish you could afford that house, landscaping, furniture, or those top-of-the-line appliances? What about those spiffy new car commercials or the Viking River Cruise advertisements on PBS? If you're like me, you find you routinely covet a lot! You wish you had more, had better, yet knowing you already have so much!

A recent Gospel reading (Mark 10:17-31) told us about the rich man asking Jesus what he had to do to inherit eternal life, something all of us want. Jesus tells him to sell what he owns and give his money to the poor! Jesus goes on to say, "It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God."

Well, let me tell you, I want to inherit the kingdom of God, and yet this Gospel reading causes me a fair amount of angst. I simply am not prepared to sell everything and give away my savings. For one thing, my husband wouldn't let me, and for another, I'm simply not prepared to do so. There is hope though for me and for you.

Pastor Keith's October 10th sermon told us that this was God's plan for this particular rich man, and not necessarily God's explicit instruction to all of us. However, we are asked to give back to God what he has first given to us; what that would be is a very individual decision between you and God. That's why we are so blessed to have a progressive pastor and a congregation that developed the Zion's Seven Marks of Discipleship, (Pray, Worship, Study, Invite, Serve, Encourage, Give and Serve) to help all of us grow in faith.

STORIES OF FAITH IN ACTION 2020-2021

Bolstered by relationships

Jesús Escamilla knows the power of relationships. Over 15 years, he's seen God provide for his congregation through faithful partners across the church and within his community.

“What God wants, if you believe and trust in how he wants to do it, it will get done,” said the pastor of San Gabriel Lutheran Church in Alvarado, Texas.

Escamilla came to San Gabriel in 2006, when future congregants were holding Bible studies weekly in worshipers' homes. To worship, they drove more than 30 miles north to San Miguel Lutheran Church in Fort Worth. He joined the Bible studies, then became the faith community's official worship leader a year later, ministering in homes for both Bible study and worship. In time, the growing faith community needed a building in Alvarado.

A deal with a local supporter allowed the congregation to begin renting a plot of land, where it worshiped outdoors and eventually built makeshift indoor worship space. “Everyone was dusty, but they didn't care because they had a place to worship — their own place,” Escamilla said.

Over time, partnerships with local congregations allowed San Gabriel to build a permanent church. Gifts from Calvary Lutheran Church in Richland Hills allowed San Gabriel to put in flooring, and pews were donated by St. John Lutheran Church, a closing congregation in nearby Grand Prairie. Later, St. John's council gifted funds that helped San Gabriel take ownership of its land. Since then, the church has grown, adding a fellowship hall that serves as a community hub for the area's largely Mexican immigrant population. But like so many congregations, San Gabriel struggled to maintain a sense of community during the worst days of the COVID-19 pandemic in the United States. The church closed and pivoted to virtual worship on Zoom and Facebook, with Escamilla, lay leaders and a small contingent of choir members recording services in person at the church. But with virtual worship, collecting offerings became a challenge. Some

congregants sent money through the digital-payment network Zelle or even left their offerings in the church mailbox, but many couldn't contribute monetarily. So the church began hosting weekly food sales to raise needed funds and provide members with a way to give back.

Escamilla believes that San Gabriel has been built up by the generosity of others — church members, nearby ELCA congregations and, through Mission Support funds, the ELCA Northern Texas-Northern Louisiana Synod.

"It's been a conjunction of [congregations] working together to help a community that was struggling," he said. "We have this wonderful community that is working together to work with what the Lord wants us to do."

Electronic Piano in Our Worship Area ---



Our Kurzweil electronic piano has been a part of our worship experience since the fall of 2000. The computer that it contained was quite a few years older. This summer it finally died. With the approval of Zion's Congregation Council, a new Yamaha electronic piano has been purchased for a total cost of \$4,772. Due to the challenges that COVID has brought to the world of commerce, it may be a few months before the piano arrives. We will be using some designated and undesignated Memorial money to help pay for the piano, and we welcome any and all additional gifts towards this purchase. 
Indoor in-person worship

Indoor services are held every Sunday. ***At this time, Zion is no longer requiring you to reserve a pew for the in-person indoor worship. However, it is subject to change*** and is dependent upon the positive test rate and the probability rate. Social distancing practices will continue to be used (no passing of the peace or offering plate, limited & soft singing). Please visit Zion's website to read the [Protocols for In-Person Indoor Worship - all adults in attendance are required to wear a mask that covers the nose and mouth](#) (the exception being Pastor who is leading worship).

At this time, we acknowledge that there is some risk involved. Even though as of October 27, our local total population is 53.87% vaccinated which surpasses our safer goal of 50%, our 65+ age group is over our safe goal at 90.17%. The 18 & up vaccinated average is currently at 64.03%. We are also watching the test positivity rate. Our area's positivity rate is 10.61%, which is over our goal and persists above it. Cases per 100,000 has been dropping but remains high. Another measurement is a percentage of probability where, in a gathering of 50 people, how likely is it that someone with COVID-19 would be present. Right now, there is a 76% chance of this happening. We are watching the trend of each graph with what are considered to be safer and safe goals in mind. The data used in the graphs is collected from the CDC website and from a website tool provided to us from our Northern Great Lakes Synod.
