# "O Come, Emmanuel"

O come, O come, Emmanuel and ransom captive Israel, that mourns in lonely exile here until the Son of God appear. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to you, O Israel.

As I write this it has been just a few days since the horror and tragedy that took place at the Christmas parade in Waukesha, the hometown of Karen and me. We both marched in the high

school band that was hit. The granddaughter of my cousin was supposed to march with the children's dance group that was also struck, but she did not because it was too cold. I remember going to that parade as a very young child, weeks before my brother was born. I got an earache shortly after attending that parade. (Mom, who did not attend the parade that year, was certain my earache was due to not covering my ears well with my cap as I watched for Santa.) "O come, Emmanuel and ransom captive Israel, that mourns in lonely exile here." These words powerfully express the deep sorrow on our souls and the yearning that sorrow creates.


I remember singing "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" more than once at the bedside of a member who was dying at this time of the year. It was easy to sing the opening verse but extremely jarring and difficult to sing the refrain, "Rejoice! Rejoice!" There was no rejoicing happening as this loved one was dying and yet the words so powerfully pointed to the truth that gives us hope at the deaths of our loved ones or when children are struck by an SUV: "Emmanuel shall come to you."

I heard someone the other day describe this as a Christmas hymn, but it is not. It is definitely an Advent hymn that expresses the longing that unites humanity through the

ages. We long for a hope that is greater than the pain which too often tears at our lives. We long for Emmanuel, "God with us." And because of this infant who was born in a stable so many years ago, and died on a cross thirty-three years later, we can dare to hope and even, (deep breath), rejoice because we know that Emmanuel is coming. We need Advent and Advent's hymns because the yearning expressed during this season leads us to the joyful twelveday Christmas celebration; the realization that, unbidden, Christ invades our lives which are too often filled with pain and sadness. Christ brings compassion, grace, forgiveness, love, and new life, the best Christmas gifts of all.

Savor the longing and the yearning of Advent this year, with the knowledge that "Emmanuel shall come to you." Rejoice, and have a very merry Christmas.

### **Letter from Bishop Finegan**

Dear Northern Great Lakes Synod,

You have no doubt noticed the increasing darkness. The kids go to school in the dark, and soon, the school day will end as it began, in darkness. The hours of light are getting shorter and shorter, and people are grateful for lingering twilight.



How ironic that the most hopeful season of the church year begins as the darkness increases. In the weeks to come, we light candles on the Advent wreath, and it's not a moment too soon. These lights of hope stand against the growing darkness. And every week, as we add the flame of another candle, the light will increase and shine brighter even

as the darkness comes sooner and lasts longer.

I love hearing the voices of others raised in song and prayer. It has felt like salve on a wound to share the peace, sing alto to someone's soprano, and hear combined voices pray the Lord's prayer together in the rhythm and cadence of voices in unison. While I truly believe that some sense of community can be achieved and appreciated through Zoom, YouTube, and Facebook live, the joy and value of the community gathered in person is also true and real.

# Our synod is newly connected through Lifelong Faith Formation, Pastoral Leader Check-Ins, and various Zoom meetings.

While I have missed being able to add lunch and snacks to in person Synod meetings, in many ways we are more connected as a synod than we have ever been. Teachers and students from the Copper Country to Marinette, from Ironwood to Sault Ste. Marie gather in virtual classrooms and discussion groups. We are church together in a whole new way, gathering to discuss and wrestle with conversations about issues of race, scriptural interpretation, and to consider and plan various ministry efforts.

In all our efforts, in all our re-evaluations, in all the changes and future uncertainty, the Spirit of the living Christ is gathering, inspiring, supporting, and guiding. We are discovering again what it means to be church, what the purpose of the Body of Christ is in this world, and who we are in mission together. I

#### **Congregation Council Highlights**

On Nov. 9th, 2021 the congregational council met via Zoom. Pastor Keith reported a decline in attendance for the month of

October. He held two funeral services. He will be supervising an intern, off-site, for one year.

Escanaba who was a pastor in another denomination and wants to become a Lutheran Pastor.

Pastor Keith has a vacation

planned for November, and one for a Sunday in December. The October financial report showed a general fund increase for the month, with a year-to-date decrease of \$6,336. The disbursement to the EagleHerald for advertising has been depleted, therefore, newspaper

advertising will cease. The council discussed the order of funds to be used in payment of the new piano. The council also discussed exploring options for better interest rates on CD's. The Property Committee is awaiting an estimate to replace the motor on the bell. Snow removal will be the same as it was last year. Stewardship and Generosity Committee reported that the fall drive is underway with mail and email delivered. And Personnel will be meeting to complete staff evaluations and work on salary suggestions for the budget.

Worship will be indoors during the winter months with Communion offered outside afterward as weather permits, moving indoors when weather dictates, continuing to follow safety protocols. The SPARK Christmas program planning is in place with a performance to be held on December 19th. The council discussed the possibility of holding two separate Christmas Eve worship services. Faithful Innovations continues to move forward with their TikTok project and continues to look to develop a social media committee.

The next Congregational Council meeting will be held Dec. 14th.

#### **Equal in God's Kingdom**

Cholita Narzary made history in November 2020 as the second woman ordained into ministry by the Bodo Evangelical Lutheran Church (BELC) in Assam, India. She joined the roster 22 years after the denomination ordained its first woman, the late Kunanjaw Basumatary, who served as BELC bishop in the past. "Since the first woman's ordination there were many silent years," said Ichahak Muchahary, BELC bishop. "The church becomes a family only with the recognition of women as equal partners in God's vineyard."

Muchahary credits the ELCA-organized 2019 South East Asia Conference on Gender Justice in Hyderabad, India, for pushing him and other leaders to advocate for and implement gender justice shifts within the church. The ELCA has accompanied the BELC for two years, funding some of its ministries through Mission Support. Since entering a formal companion relationship with the BELC in 2018, the ELCA has accompanied the church with mutual encouragement and leadership training events and funded community development, disaster response and academic scholarships (including for International Women Leaders). Said Narzary of her ordination, "I knew the call of God from my childhood, but due to my parents and others, I could not go for further biblical studies. It took me long years, and it was really challenging for a girl like me to [acknowledge] my true [vocation]."

Prior to 2020, Narzary served as an evangelist and Sunday school teacher within the BELC and received training at the Karnataka Theological College in Mangalore (India).

She currently works as women's coordinator for the BELC, manages its Silk Research and Development Centre and leads a local parish.

Muchahary said Narzary's ordination has paved the way for the BELC to ordain more women. Currently six are pursuing theological studies in different seminaries in India and, in 2021

the BELC General Council adopted a resolution to implement 41% gender representation in all its governing bodies, in compliance with the Lutheran World Federation's gender justice policy. With those amendments, Narzary hopes that many qualified and ordained women will take leadership positions in the BELC. "Women have always been in the forefront of Jesus' ministry," she said. "I strongly believe that men and women are equal in God's kingdom, both bearing the image of God. Now, after experiencing the work that women are also capable [of], the church will open the door for other women too."


# Altar Flower Sponsorships\_


Zion has altar flower sponsorships available. The cost of sponsoring the flowers for one week is \$15.00. Dates are reserved on a first come first serve basis. To reserve a date, please call or email Zion's office at 715-732- 7898 or Zion@newbc.rr.com.

Indoor services are held every Sunday. At this time, Zion is no longer requiring you to reserve a pew for the in-person indoor worship. However, it is subject to change and is dependent upon the positive test rate and the probability rate. Social distancing practices will continue to be used (no passing of the peace or offering plate, limited & soft singing). Please visit Zion's website to read the Protocols for In-Person Indoor Worship - all adults in attendance are required to wear a mask that covers the nose and mouth (the exception being Pastor who is leading worship).

At this time, we acknowledge that there is some risk involved. Even though as of November 24, our local total population is 54.93% vaccinated which surpasses our safer goal of 50%, our 65+ age group is over our safe goal at 90.70%. The 18 & up vaccinated average is currently at 65.27%. We are also watching the test positivity rate. Our area's positivity rate is 11.59%, which is over our goal and persists above it. Cases per 100,000 has been dropping but remains high. Another measurement is a percentage of probability where, in a gathering of 50 people, how likely is it that someone with COVID-19 would be present. Right now, there is a 78.33% chance of this happening. We are watching the trend of each graph with what are considered to be safer and safe goals in mind. The data used in the graphs is collected from the CDC website and from a website tool provided to us from our Northern Great Lakes Synod.
