Friends of Jesus

A few years ago I saw a cartoon in which a man, praying on his knees, was wondering aloud why Jesus would bring all of his friends whenever he asked Jesus to come into his life. In the cartoon we see a figure of Jesus surrounded by the poor, the needy, the injured, the lost, the forgotten, and the despised. Certainly, this is how it is with Jesus. It is never just “me and Jesus.” It is always, “Jesus, all his friends, and me.” Jesus helps us to understand this in the story he tells in Matthew 25:31-46, where the sheep and the goats are being separated at the final judgment. Jesus said that serving the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the naked, the sick, and the imprisoned was serving him. In this story, he’s saying that they are more than his friends: They are him.

Jesus makes this same point in the Beatitudes. Who gets the blessings? It is the poor, the hungry, the weeping, the hated, and the persecuted (Luke 6:20-26). As Jason Gray describes it in his song, “Blessed Be,” these blessing come to “all the lovely losers. The kingdom comes to the broken ones.”

In Holy Week we face the reality that we too are the broken ones, and that the death of Christ is for all the broken ones. The proclamation of Easter is that God gives new life to the broken ones. Jesus makes the losers lovely. Therefore, when we recognize Jesus residing in our hearts and all these friends that Jesus likes to bring along, we are thrilled by their presence, because we see ourselves within that group. We see lovely losers joined together in the body and blood of Christ our Lord.

Eastern Europe Crisis Response

On Feb. 24, Russian forces invaded Ukraine, launching land, sea and air attacks.

Airports are now shut, and few railway lines are operational. Civilians fleeing the violence are heading toward Ukraine's western districts and such neighboring countries as Poland, Moldova, Slovakia, Romania and Hungary. Hundreds of thousands of people are seeking refuge in neighboring countries. There are major humanitarian concerns for both internally displaced people and refugees. Many of these Ukrainians fleeing their homes need shelter, basic necessities and pastoral care.

Lutheran Disaster Response is accompanying our companions in Ukraine, Hungary, Poland and Slovakia, as well as such ecumenical partners as Lutheran World Federation and Church World Service, in their humanitarian responses to the crisis. These partners provide refugees with immediate support and supplies such as food, blankets, water and hygiene kits.

Dear Northern Great Lakes Synod,
I remember my first time going to Bible camp, where the youth of the church and their friends gather for a week of fun, fellowship, learning, and more.

As often happens at Bible camp, the campers were led through a series of team building exercises, one of which was “The Trust Fall.” I would guess many of you have participated in this exercise and even as you read this, you’re remembering your own experience. Did they catch you? Did you fall to the ground? Did you drop anybody?

For those of you unfamiliar with “The Trust Fall,” I give you the following description. Imagine you are standing on the very edge of a picnic table, with just enough of your toes on one end to keep you standing on the table and your heels hanging off the side. You have been instructed that at the moment when you fall back that you are to cross your arms over your chest to keep from flailing wildly and accidentally whacking someone in the face or taking out a fellow camper’s eye. Your heart begins to race as you watch your fellow campers below the table arrange themselves in two lines. They stand facing each other starting from the edge of that picnic table. Their arms are outstretched in a pattern that alternates elbows and wrists, left and right, from each side of the line.

You look down at them at what seems like a very flimsy zippered net of skinny middle school arms. Sure, there’s the camp counselor, but that person is not particularly positioned to catch you. Your fellow campers are supposed to catch you...with their scrawny pre-pubescent arms they’re supposed to catch you. These fellow middle school campers look up at you, and you can

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see that they're not so sure about this either. The full magnitude of this action settles into your gut as you realize what this all means, that you're supposed to fall backwards from the discomfiting four-foot height of the picnic table into this bony net of weak, angular wrists and elbows, mere ulnas and radiuses, that you're quite sure will snap and break like dry twigs when your body slams into them.

You have never witnessed a trust fall, and you're pretty sure that you're going to get hurt somehow. But the camp counselor assures you that all will be well. You consider stepping off that picnic table, but everyone is looking at you, and you don't want to be considered a coward. So you steel yourself, cross your arms over your chest, and with grim resolve, face forward. You hear your counselor say, "Ready?" and you reply with a conviction you don't feel, "Ready!" Fall away!

And through an act of will you let your body fall backward. But really, more accurately, you let go of what's keeping you upright, you let go of fear and apprehension, you let go of all the reasons not to let go. You let your body fall....and you trust that scrawny net of bony pre-pubescent arms to catch you even as you brace yourself for a spine jarring impact on your tail bone. For a brief, shining, moment, you are airborne. You are in flight. You are weightless, until you feel those scrawny arms catch you, surprising in their strength, their resolve, to care for you, to keep you safe, and not let you hit the ground.

And you are amazed! Euphoric! The adrenaline of that brief act of courage hits you like a wave of joy. You are so relieved...and surprised! Who knew scrawny pre-pubescent arms could work so well together? To catch even a body in free fall? Who knew? In Hebrews 11:1 we read, "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen."

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For the past two years, in many ways, we have been in freefall... this untethered descent into the space of the unknown, uncertain of our landing, unsure of the damages and unclear how much we can depend on those we need to depend on.

No, the pandemic is not over. No, we have not yet “landed.” Yet, God gives us instructions through Jesus the Christ as to how we should line up in order to provide safety for ourselves and others. One of us, alone, cannot provide the needed support, but all of us together, with combined strength and resolve, can work well together, no matter how ill equipped we might seem. We have Christ’s own assurance, that even though we cannot see the presence of God, God is with us.

Ultimately, in faith, we trust that God will catch us. In faith, we trust that together, we have what it takes to care for each other and keep each other safe. In faith, we are stronger than we know and braver than we feel. In faith, we have received the promise of God’s abiding presence.

We may not ever feel ready, and yet, in faith, by the grace of God, we are blessed to “fall away” and feel the love of God in the many arms of the community of faith that seek to catch us.

Congregation Council Highlights



The congregational council met via Zoom and in person on March 8th, 2022 at 6:30 pm. Pastor Keith's report said that February attendance was a bit lower than last year. Pastor attended the Professional Leaders Event in Marquette 2/27-28. He helped lead the Synod Faithful Innovation Training on 3/5. There will be a Blood Drive held at Zion on May 13, 2022. Nancy Saltee funeral will be held at Zion on April 30, 2022. Pastor announced his post retirement employment will be as part time Chaplain at NLRC.

The financial report shows the General Fund decreased \$6,495. Capital Improvement Fund increased \$558.

The Property Committee is working on estimate to fix the bell. The hot water issue in the kitchen has been fixed. Johnston Furnace was contacted in regards to fixing the the worship area pump motor.

Social Ministry's Souper Bowl collections ended February 13 were distributed between area schools and NEWCAP. World Hunger Drive is off to a great start.

All COVID numbers are in the target range; this has made masks optional and Communion by Intinction, touchless sharing of peace and offering were included in worship. Conference gathering for Synod Assembly May 14, 2022 at Zion.

There was a Council vacancy on 2/18/22. Chad D resigned from Council, Mark Swenson agreed to fill said vacancy. Discussions were held regarding Bishop Finegan, an interim pastor and a Zoom subscription, which costs \$150.

The date for the next Council meetings are April 12 and 19.

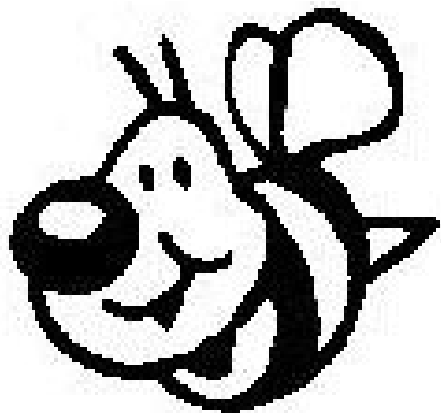
World Hunger Buzz — ICYMI

Many Ways to be Connected

As churches returned to in-person worship in 2021, many expressed thanks for the online support that the ELCA Worship team at the churchwide organization provided during the pandemic lockdowns.

When pandemic restrictions halted in-person worship in March 2020, the Worship team provided resources for worship at home, technological advice for online services, guidance for reopening church buildings safely, and tips on resuming congregational song in line with federal guidelines, said John Weit, a deacon and ELCA executive for worship.

These resources, Weit said, are funded through Mission Support.

“We’re very thankful for the Mission Support that we receive, and we’re happy to be able to give back to the congregations by providing online resources during the pandemic.”

Of those resources, the “Worship in the Home” webpage was especially popular, Weit said, because it included Scripture, hymn links prayers and reflections for each Sunday.

Many congregations already had the technology and know-how to stream services live or use social media platforms such as Facebook Live, but those who didn’t relied heavily on the resources provided by Worship. Gwenn Trout, pastor of Zion (Enola) and Zion (Etters) Lutheran churches in Pennsylvania, used those resources to record services from her home via Zoom and post the videos on Facebook Live.

With the help of a tech-savvy congregant, Trout figured out how to make it all work. Now both Zions are hybrid churches, combining online and in-person services. “We’ve learned the importance of hybrid church and of reaching out ... online,” Trout said.

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Sandra Rudd, pastor of Sitka (Alaska) Lutheran Church also found the online resources to be a blessing. In addition to using them for online worship each Sunday, her congregation printed out the “Worship in the Home” readings and reflections and hand-delivered them to members who lacked internet access.

“The pandemic was a stark illustration of the fact that the church is not a building,” she said. “A lot of people say that, but we didn’t fully know it until we didn’t have a building to use. We learned that there are many ways to be connected as the church.”

Masking is Optional

The number of COVID-19 active infections and the positivity rate have declined to safe levels. This, along with a high vaccination rate among those who typically join us for worship, guided the Congregation Council at its March 8th meeting to decide that masking will be optional for all activities within Zion's building, including worship. The Council also decided that our worship service will go back to our pre-pandemic practices, which will include holy communion by intinction around our altar and collecting the offering, (ushers will hold the plates). We will practice a "touchless" sharing of the Peace with waves, head nods, and lots of smiling. As soon as there is someone to sponsor coffee time following worship, that too will be available. Of course, we will continue to monitor the infection rate in our community and will take appropriate actions if they become necessary.
