Worship in Spirit and Truth

Most of the 4th chapter of the Gospel of John is devoted to Jesus' encounter with a Samaritan woman—the woman at the well. In their conversation, they talk about the proper place to worship. For Jews, it was the temple in Jerusalem. For the Samaritans, it was Mt. Gerizim. Jesus said to her, “But the hour is coming, and is now here when the true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for the Father seeks such as these to worship him.” While places of worship, like Zion's beautiful sanctuary, are important to us and enhance our worship experience, worship is primarily a matter of the heart. As worship is the theme of this month's stewardship emphasis based on the Seven Marks of Discipleship, I would like to share some thoughts with our readers on worship as a central part of my faith journey.

I have been through four official hymnals and several supplementary hymnals in my lifetime as a Lutheran which has provided a foundation for my worship life. We commonly refer to them by their color (black, red, green, and now cranberry). Each one has been a cherished source of hymns, liturgies, psalms, prayers, occasional services, and other sources for devotion and inspiration. Each has reflected changes in language, worship styles and cultural trends while preserving the essential forms of both corporate and private worship that have guided the church through the centuries. One of the first Bible verses I learned as a child was Psalm 122:1— “I was glad when they said to me, ‘Let us go to the house of the Lord’.” Those were the words spoken every

Sunday by the Sunday School superintendent at my home church as he called us together for opening worship before we went to our classes. The Holy Spirit put that gladness in my heart at an early age. Worship reminds me of how important God is to me in my daily life. It connects me with God. When I praise God, life becomes a song of praise. Leading worship, preaching, and administering the sacraments has been the greatest joy of my ministry.

Probably the oldest and most oft-told joke pastors must endure is that ministers only work one day of the week. In reality, when I was working full-time, Sunday was the one day I didn't work. Sunday was my play day. It was the culmination of my week's work. It was and still is pure joy. Pastor Waldemar "Fram" Framstad, a dear friend and former parishioner, would often greet me at the door at the conclusion of the worship service and exclaim, "this is my happy hour!" If Sunday morning is not your "happy hour," then I encourage you to look deep within and recognize your need to be in communion with God and in fellowship with God's people.

I am so pleased to serve Zion congregation as your Interim Pastor. In that role, I take no responsibility more seriously than leading you in worship—proclaiming God's word and administering the sacraments as vehicles of God's grace. I pray fervently that this congregation will continue to engage in vibrant worship and that Zion will continue to be a place where people experience the living presence of Jesus Christ in word and sacrament and in the midst is people.

COUNCIL UPDATES

The congregational council met June 14th, 2022 at 6:30 pm.

Pastors Report: May 2022 Attendance-105, Pastor Doug reported that he is doing home communion visits on two Tuesdays a month to help supplement the Caring

Ministry Team; he is enjoying getting to know some of the homebound members of Zion.

May Financial Report: General Fund increased \$9,518; Capital Improvement Fund Increased \$1,204. A proposal was made to start a Call Fund with \$2400.00 a month to be put aside.

Committee Reports:

Youth Ministry — VBS will be held August 8-11, 2022, from 5-7 p.m., Stephanie Ehle from Bethel is spearheading this with Johanna Zuehls being Zion's contact.

Mission Endowment Fund — Meeting was held June 6th and distributions totaling \$7500.00 were agreed upon by the endowment committee.

Old Business:

Kitchen Refrigerator — Council approved the purchase of a new refrigerator from Drees Electric.

Zoom Room Visit — Dave, Brad, Mark and Troy visited Mt Olive, sound quality was discussed as the most important issue. The council will be looking into the upgrading of the AV equipment in the sanctuary.

Boiler Resolution — Accepted the bid from Johnston Furnace Service including Options 1,2 and 3. Total price to be determined after account credit and energy grant.

New Business:

Unused chairs — Small chairs located just outside the worship center are free to congregation members. If people are not interested, then we will reach out to daycares, etc.

Approval of Kolstad Gift for Accountant — Council reviewed and agreed that all conditions were met to be approved as a gift.

The Aschim family requested to be removed from Zion's Membership. The council approved their request.

Membership — 26 letters were sent to inactive members. We received 3 responses to continue membership and 1 response for removal. 23 members were dropped.

Safety/Security Task Force — Dave J will head this up with discussion resuming in August.

NEWCAP Donations — The NEWCAP Food Pantry is now closed. Any monies designated for NEWCAP will be sent to other services. The Social Ministry Committee was notified so a discussion can be held on where best to donate food.

Lori Kirt has resigned from her Council position due to a heavy workload.

The next council meeting will be August 9 at 6:30 p.m.

The goal of Zion's Stewardship and Generosity Committee is to help God's people grow in their relationship with Jesus through the use of the time, talents, and finances God has entrusted to them.

Every weekend in July brings new and interesting things to do starting with the July 4th celebrations. There may also be family vacations and reunions, picnics, weddings, swimming at the beach, bazaars, and a vast array of other activities that are typically crammed into the warm month of July.

Amidst all this activity it's often hard to make time to attend a worship service. If this describes you and your family, it's good to know that we are fortunate to have alternatives.

In person worship is always preferred as it connects you with other Christians making the worship experience more meaningful. The next best thing, however, is having the ability to watch Sunday worship live on Zion's Facebook page. This is wonderful, especially for shut-ins and congregation members, who for one reason or another, cannot travel to Zion. While tuning in is great, it may not be ideal especially if time for worship is limited.

We are blessed to have several different avenues available to us to worship God when time becomes a scarce commodity. The first is to go to Zion's Facebook page anytime during the week, whenever convenient, and click on the worship service. Another alternative is the [Northern Great Lakes Synod "Prayfaithfully" devotion](#). This one does not arrive in your inbox daily so you must connect to the Synod website. Once found this site offers daily devotions for the entire week which allows you to utilize as much of it as you wish whenever you wish.

Finally, Zion receives "The Word in Season" devotional books that cover a three-month span of time. Those small free devotional books are in Zion's lobby on the table. These are especially meaningful for people who do not have ready access to a computer, the Internet, or simply like hardcopy.

As Bonnie Schoen said in her June 12th Temple Talk, we can worship anywhere. I challenge you to see how many creative ways you can spend time with God the father, his son, Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit.



Where All May Dwell

Emily Norris had been serving at Augsburg Lutheran Church's winter-overflow homeless shelter in Winston-Salem, N.C., for a few years when she heard the rumblings. Many of the guests opened up to her, told her stories. One need kept arising.

"I heard very loudly that there was a deep hunger for a faith community that looked like them," Norris said. They craved space where they could worship God and not feel judged for their housing status, their past or their appearance. Heeding their calls led Norris to Wartburg Theological Seminary, Dubuque, Iowa, to become a pastor.

By 2020, Norris was ordained and serving as the mission developer for the Dwelling, an ELCA faith community designed for, but not exclusive to, people in Winston-Salem who are or have been homeless. Funding comes from partnerships with Augsburg, the North Carolina Synod, the Moravian Church in America and the ELCA churchwide organization, which draws on Mission Support for the Dwelling's grant.

Starting a church during a pandemic wasn't ideal. Safety restrictions made worship impossible, and the population Norris had hoped to reach became especially vulnerable. So she did what many ELCA leaders and congregations were forced to do: she pivoted.

After assessing community needs, Norris determined that free mobile showers would be the Dwelling's anchor ministry. Visitors could take showers and receive clean underwear, socks and T-shirts donated by nearby members of the Dwelling's synod.

"It was really a profound way to start," Norris said. "Showers

provide a sense of dignity and are therapeutic. I don't know a better way to remind people of their baptism."

Eventually the showers became permanent, with participants volunteering to help the program. By Christmas Eve, area restrictions for gatherings had been relaxed, and Norris held the Dwelling's first service. In January 2021, it began offering regular Sunday Worship.



With a living room for its sanctuary, couches and chairs for its pews, and free flowing food, the Dwelling takes seriously its mission of hospitality. "It has a feather touch, where you can come in and get comfy," said member Cheryl Morrison. "It's OK to talk to the person next to you, get up to get a cup of coffee, doughnut or muffin."

"This is a church for God's people — the homeless — and they are the foundation of what makes this church work, which in my eyes is extremely special," added Ryan Sprinkle, a council member. "You have people right off street with their backpacks."


Sew For Missions Update



Masking is Optional

The number of COVID-19 active infections and the positivity rate have declined to safe levels. This, along with a high vaccination rate among those who typically join us for worship, guided the Congregation Council at its March 8th meeting to decide that masking will be optional for all activities within Zion’s building, including worship. The Council also decided that our worship service will go back to our pre-pandemic practices, which will include holy communion by intinction around our altar and collecting the offering, (ushers will hold the plates). We will practice a “touchless” sharing of the Peace with waves, head nods, and lots of smiling. As soon as there is someone to sponsor coffee time following worship, that too will be available. Of course, we will continue to monitor the infection rate in our community and will take appropriate actions if they become necessary.





Eastern Europe Crisis Response

On Feb. 24, Russian forces invaded Ukraine, launching land, sea and air attacks.

Airports are now shut, and few railway lines are operational. Civilians fleeing the violence are heading toward Ukraine's western districts and such neighboring countries as Poland, Moldova, Slovakia, Romania and Hungary. Hundreds of thousands of people are seeking refuge in neighboring countries. There are major humanitarian concerns for both internally displaced people and refugees. Many of these Ukrainians fleeing their homes need shelter, basic necessities and pastoral care.

Lutheran Disaster Response is accompanying our companions in Ukraine, Hungary, Poland and Slovakia, as well as such ecumenical partners as Lutheran World Federation and Church World Service, in their humanitarian responses to the crisis. These partners provide refugees with immediate support and supplies such as food, blankets, water and hygiene kits.
