#### From the Pastor's Desk

With the midterm elections fast approaching, there have been a number of highly publicized debates between candidates for the Senate, the House and governorships in key battleground states. I used to enjoy political debates, but not anymore. They have, for the most part, ceased to be true debates where candidates respectfully argue issues in a way that helps the listeners arrive at the truth. Instead, they tend to be a series of well-prepared sound bites giving expression to each candidate's interpretation of the truth.

The Epistle reading last Sunday included this verse from Paul's 2nd Letter to Timothy: "For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths." It sounds like Paul was talking about our society today. Rather than seeking to broaden their perspective in a search for the truth, people tend to listen only to news feeds that support their own way of thinking or that support their version of the truth. Disregarding the truth, they chose to buy into disinformation and myths.

I am writing this article on the day on our church year calendar that commemorates Luke, the Evangelist. Luke begins his Gospel with these words: "Since many have undertaken to set down an orderly account of the events that have been fulfilled among us, just as they were handed on to us by those who from the beginning were eyewitnesses and servants of the word, I too decided, after investigating everything carefully from the very first to write an orderly account for you, most excellent Theophilus, so that you may know the truth concerning the things about which you have been instructed." Susan Baird-Joshi, in her devotion in *The Word in Season* for this day, says,

"As a reporter for a newspaper, I worked to reveal the truth. I interviewed knowledgeable people, usually with differing opinions; researched newspaper archives and government records; and solidified the facts when eyewitnesses told different versions of a story. I reread my notes, looking for gaps in the story. Finally, I wrote the article, giving credit to my sources. Out of this information sprang the truth." She went on to explain that Luke "acted like a reporter" in writing his Gospel. She concluded her devotion by writing, "I'm thankful I live free in the truth Luke revealed about Jesus' love for me and his death, resurrection and ascension."

As people of faith, we base our faith not on myths and falsehoods, but on the truth based on "sound doctrine" that has been handed down from the teachings of Jesus recorded in the Bible and the preaching of the Apostles who were eye-witnesses to Jesus' life, death and resurrection. The Apostles' and Nicene Creeds we use to confess our faith each Sunday in our services of worship were formulated early in the history of the Christian Church to safeguard the teaching and preaching of the Apostles and hand it down, intact and unaltered, to each new generation of believers. We come to worship to hear the truth as expressed in scripture, hymns, liturgy and preaching so that we do not "wander away into myths."

October 30th is Reformation Sunday. We will celebrate our Lutheran heritage remembering Martin Luther's spiritual quest to find a gracious God and be assured of his salvation. He was brought up in the faith influenced by the myth that we have to earn our salvation by appeasing an angry God. Then, in reading Paul's assuring words in Romans 1:16-17 and other related texts, Luther made the discovery that changed his life. Salvation is a gift from a loving and gracious God to be received by faith, not in ourselves, but in Jesus Christ who died for us that we may be saved. In our worship service that day we will participate in the Rite of Confirmation for our 9th graders in which they will

confirm their faith in the truths they have learned in their confirmation studies. We will hear in the gospel reading, Jesus' words to those who believed in him, "If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free." Then, on November 6, we will observe All Saints Sunday which celebrates another truth that lies at the heart of the gospel—those who die in Christ will rise with him to dwell forever in God's heavenly kingdom. So, as people of faith, let us live in the truth and live out the truth in our daily lives. Then we can say, along with Susan Baird-Joshi, "I'm thankful I live free in the truth Luke revealed about Jesus' love for me and his death, resurrection and ascension." That, my friends, is the truth and the truth will make you free!

#### **Fortune Lake Lutheran Camp:**

Dear Friends at Zion Lutheran Church,

Our Vagabond campers have a tradition of tubing down the Paint River. Most would describe it as a leisurely float, where dragonflies land on the brightly colored tubes, and campers sing while drifting carelessly downstream. For some, however, it's a grand adventure, an opportunity to try something new and conquer fear.

One particular Tuesday, a first-time camper and his cabin leader were at the tail end of the tubing group. Having never experienced anything like this before, the camper was both excited and anxious. He hung close to the cabin leader and sometimes needed help untangling himself from shrubs along the riverbank. When he reached the end of the route, he struggled to gain footing. His cabin leader grabbed his tube and talked him through saying. "I'm right here, and I'm not going anywhere." Hand-in-hand, they reached the extraction point and made it back on solid ground.

Here at Fortune Lake, we are working to intentionally prioritize a radical welcome to all people, particularly those who are often marginalized. In addition to exploring how our site and programs can be more inclusive, we never turn people away due to financial reasons. This camper would not have been able to afford to come to camp without assistance. His adventures were made possible by people like you.
