

From the Pastor's Desk

In my spoken report at the Annual Congregational Meeting last Sunday, I made reference to a devotional message in The Word In Season that seemed relevant to the occasion. Rev. Katherine Ewald Olson based her message on a verse from Paul's first letter the Timothy. She writes, in part, "In the letters to Timothy, we see the beginnings of the institutional church. How should leaders be treated? How should we care for the poor? In the centuries since, we know that the church has been imperfect. It has caused pain and shunned the out-

sider. The world has not always been impressed. But the same church is a place where millions have grown in faith. It is people intentionally seeking God. It is a space to learn and to grow, to serve and be served. It is imperfect, but in it we get glimpses of perfect love. And there are moments of perfect praise and perfect joy in Christ."

How well this describes the Church in general and Zion Lutheran Church in particular. Zion is as imperfect as any other congregation, but it is also a place where love, praise and joy in Christ is not merely glimpsed, but experienced in large doses. I experience it every Sunday in worship. Love is exchanged in warm greetings. Praise is expressed in enthusiastic singing and in responses to what is heard. Joy in Christ is the prevailing atmosphere whenever we gather for worship. I experience joy in Christ in church fellowship events, in meeting with the Congregation Council, a dedicated and engaged group, in confirmation classes where I meet with a wonderful group of young people who are interested and engaged, in observing SPARK meeting at the same time with Johanna Zuehls sharing her joy in Christ with the children, in the Sew for Missions group that meets on Tuesday morning and invites me to coffee, in the Transition Team that has begun its work in the initial stages of seeking a new pastor, and in the church staff working cooperatively with one

another. Joy in Christ is evident in many ways at Zion and it is contagious.

Joy in Christ was also the spirit that pervaded the Annual Congregational Meeting. There was good fellowship, appreciation expressed for those who serve in elected and volunteer capacities, and solid support for our mission going forward expressed in the passing of the proposed budget for 2023. Thanks and appreciation was extended to Katy Bauer, Dave Johnson and Sarge Rudell who completed there service on the Congregation Council. Dean Schoen completed a first term on Council and was elected to a second three-year term. Mark Swenson stepped in early last year to fulfill an unexpired term and now has been elected to a full term. LeeAnn Limberg, who meets regularly with the Council as the church treasurer, was also elected to a three-year term. Henry Zuehls, who was confirmed last October, was elected to a one-year term as youth member.

Members elected to other areas of service were the following: Don Limberg to a three-year term on the Personnel Committee; Sally Broetzmen, Sue Baxter and Ed Rowe to two-year terms on the Nominating Committee; Phil Strohl, Kin Swenson, Karen Dill and Calista Thill to three-year terms on the Mission Endowment Committee; and Laura Rowe and Karen Sylvester to be this year's Synod Assembly delegates. Thank you to these dedicated members for their willingness to serve. With so many members using their God-given gifts and abilities, Zion is moving forward, as it has for 140+ years, giving witness to the glory of God, to joy in Christ, and to the leading of the Holy Spirit.

Letter from Bishop Finegan

"You do well
if you really fulfill the royal law according to the scripture,
'You shall love your neighbor
as yourself.'"
~James 2:8



Dear Northern Great Lakes Synod, Have you heard the phrase, "Birds of a feather flock together?" This little saying acknowledges what we all know; we gravitate towards the familiar and the comfortable. We like to be with people who think like us, behave like us, believe the same things as us, maybe even look like us. It's natural. I suppose some anthropologist

could give a long treatise on herd mentality or the role such affinity plays in survival.

Other observers of societal norms would offer that social media has intensified this phenomenon. Online algorithms supply us with posts that affirm our foregone conclusions. Worse, there are more than a few memes out there that characterize anyone with an opposing view as being fair game for mockery or dismissed as unworthy. Beware of viewpoints being portrayed in the extreme, with no room for nuance or grey area.

It is becoming more and more rare that people gather with birds of another feather, where their world view or assumptions or convictions are challenged. People talk about echo chambers, where we proclaim what we believe to be true only to hear it echo back to us as proof.

The thing is, if we only surround ourselves with people who agree with us, if we never encounter a contrary opinion and explore it for its valid points, if we avoid conversations that invite deeper thinking, broader understanding, or a push back against what we consciously or unconsciously believe to be true then we

have stopped learning and our lack of engagement contributes to the polarization of our society and the underlying anger that results from feeling misunderstood.

A remedy for this is intentional engagement and deep listening, not to argue a point or change someone's mind, but to understand the reasons that support another perspective. To that end, our Synod will be offering a Lenten Kaleidoscope Challenge. Our NGLS Kaleidoscope in Christ task force seeks to provide more opportunities for our synod to see others through the eyes of Jesus so that we can better, as James and elsewhere in scripture urges, "love your neighbor as yourself."

Because it is more than a little difficult to love what we do not understand or stay present with topics or people that make us uncomfortable.

So during Lent, you are invited to engage the resources on our website under The Kaleidoscope Challenge. Short videos, articles, movies, and books are linked there for you to watch, read, and study. I encourage you to consciously lower your defenses, raise your awareness, and learn something new about racial equity, our indigenous neighbors, and the LGBTQIA+ community. And you are invited to join a small group of people every week via zoom to process and discuss the resources for that week. What do you have questions about? What surprised you? What challenged you? What pricked your compassion? Your curiosity? Your emotions?

On our synod website, www.nglsynod.org, you can register for the cohort of your choosing. A variety of leaders, dates, and times are available.

At a time when people are quick to anger and disagree, I hope that our Church and your church can lead the way toward mutual respect and understanding. As Martin Luther once said, "God

doesn't need your good works, but your neighbor does." For the sake of community, for the sake of the command of Jesus to love, for the sake of our neighbor, let us do the homework that will lead to authentic witness and put the love we have for Jesus into action.

The goal of Zion's Stewardship and Generosity Committee is to help God's people grow in their relationship with Jesus through the use of the time, talents, and finances God has entrusted to them.

We are nearing the last turn of our Year-Long Stewardship Initiative with emphasis on the Seven Marks of Discipleship, and it occurred to me that Zion just utilized the six marks we have focused on thus far, all at one time in January — Pray, Worship, Serve, Give, Encourage, and Invite. (Study will be the final mark of emphasis next month). Let me explain.

INVITE: Phone calls, emails, texts, word of mouth, and newspaper articles invited people to the visitation, funeral, and luncheon.

ENCOURAGE: The lines at the visitation were long as people waited patiently to encourage the family and offer words of compassion and support.

WORSHIP: One hundred forty plus people attended the funeral worship service which included prayers, Bible lessons, hymns, and Holy Communion.

GIVE: During the funeral, Ann Buscher accompanied Johanna Zuehls as she beautifully sang music specifically requested by Shirley. Johanna and Ann willingly gave of their God-given talents.

SERVE: Shirley had asked for a light lunch, but honestly, I'm not

sure Zion knows how to do a light lunch. The funeral luncheon team co-led by Michelle Larson and me sprang into action. Emails and phone calls were made, and Zion members served by setting up, preparing food, waiting on tables, and cleaning up.

More GIVE: The giving continued after the luncheon too. Once the family took some food for later, the remainder was packaged and taken to the Abundant Life Mission in Menominee.

This congregation cares, shares, and gives of their time, talents and resources when asked and sometimes even without being asked. We are a family, and we look out for and care for our family. We are Going Where Jesus Leads as we embrace the Seven Marks of Discipleship. We are truly blessed.

After this funeral, it was discovered that we need help. We are down to one active funeral team rather than the three teams that were formed many years ago. Each team is composed of two leaders who use available procedure documents and divide duties between willing volunteers. Please prayerfully consider volunteering as a team leader, as without additional leadership, Zion may not be able to continue this ministry. It is an opportunity to serve and bless others through your service.

Fortune Lake Lutheran Camp

Dear Friends at Zion Lutheran Church,

Our Vagabond campers have a tradition of tubing down the Paint River. Most would describe it as a leisurely float, where dragonflies land on the brightly colored tubes, and campers sing while drifting carelessly downstream. For some, however, it's a grand adventure, an opportunity to try something new and conquer fear.

One particular Tuesday, a first-time camper and his cabin leader were at the tail end of the tubing group. Having never experienced anything like this before, the camper was both excited and anxious. He hung close to the cabin leader and sometimes needed help untangling himself from shrubs along the riverbank. When he reached the end of the route, he struggled to gain footing. His cabin leader grabbed his tube and talked him through saying. "I'm right here, and I'm not going anywhere." Hand-in-hand, they reached the extraction point and made it back on solid ground.

Here at Fortune Lake, we are working to intentionally prioritize a radical welcome to all people, particularly those who are often marginalized. In addition to exploring how our site and programs can be more inclusive, we never turn people away due to financial reasons. This camper would not have been able to afford to come to camp without assistance. His adventures were made possible by people like you.

Thank you for valuing God's work through the ministry of Fortune Lake Lutheran Camp enough to support it through your giving. We couldn't do this important work without you!

STORIES OF FAITH IN ACTION 2023

Yamilka Hernández Guzmán always loved education and had a talent for teaching. A psychologist in an oncology hospital in Cuba, she looked for answers to the daily struggle for life she witnessed. A patient suggested to her that knowing Jesus might help, and a friend who attended a nearby Lutheran church invited Hernández Guzman to join her at worship. Shortly thereafter, the congregation's pastor asked Hernández Guzman to lend her teaching talents to a youth ministry.

The United Evangelical Church in Cuba Lutheran Synod (IEU-SL) joined the Lutheran World Federation in 2018, and because Cuba lacks an immigrant Lutheran tradition, the church relies on bivocational leaders, lay and rostered, to maintain an education system that can teach the church's 1,500 members the hows and whys of a Lutheran life.

Though teaching children seemed like a big task for a new member, Hernández Guzmán tackled it and then started teaching adults at the church's informal seminary. "I have a talent," she said. "At least, I think it's a talent—to teach people that don't have a high level of education or training. However, with me, they learn the Bible and theology. I led people through studies at seminary, people that I think no institution would have considered. They learned and learned. And wherever I went, people always called me to teach."

Eventually Hernández Guzmán was called to serve as pastor of a congregation. In 2019 a scholarship from the ELCA's International Leadership Development Program allowed her to pursue doctoral studies at Faculdades EST, a Lutheran seminary in Brazil.

The International Women Leaders program was founded to enhance the missional capacity of our global church. Our companion churches raise up talented people to pursue advanced degrees that the ELCA finances. Once they complete their studies, students return to their home churches better equipped to serve and lead.

Hernández Guzmán is working to formalize theological education at the IEU-SL school. Thus far it has empowered church leaders to create a liturgy blending Lutheran and Cuban traditions. However, it needs someone with a doctorate to establish a program of studies that will train leaders at a higher level.

"It's not possible to be a leader in the church without a minimum of biblical and theological preparation," Hernández Guzmán said, "precisely because the essence of our faith is an evangelical faith lived in freedom. That freedom is based on a personal relationship with God. But that has to come from an understanding of what God is, where God comes from, how God has a relationship with us, and the things God wants from us.
