#### From the Pastor's Desk

On February 2, Groundhog Day, Punxutawney Phil came out of his den and saw his shadow, proverbially indicating that we would have six more weeks of winter. On Ash Wednesday, even if we observe it at home due to weather-related cancellation, we see the shadow of the cross indicating six weeks of Lent. For some Christians, Lent can be a downer. "All that somber music and talk about a cross. Groan! Can't we just jump to Easter and have happy thoughts?" Lutheran Pastor and college religion professor, Roy Hammerling, said it well: "Even as Christians, we are tempted to take short cuts. Many believers in America go to church on Christmas and Easter because Christmas offers a cute baby and Easter offers a risen Lord. Christians attempt to take a short cut around Good Friday in order to have a God who is more to our liking."

I propose that Lent can be, and is intended to be, a deeply meaningful and spiritually enriching season if we take its message to heart. On Transfiguration Sunday (Feb. 19), the last Sunday of the Epiphany season, we read the story in Exodus of Moses spending 40 days and 40 nights on Mt. Sinai when God gave him the Ten Commandments on tablets of stone. Harvard Stephens, writing in *Christ in Our Home*, reflected on this and observed, "Whenever scriptures tell a story that takes 40 days and 40 nights to unfold, we are being reminded that sometimes God interrupts our normal routines to show us signs of grace and truth that may change our lives. Some call these experiences 'a time apart'—and we should cherish the variety of ways these opportunities can appear."

So, we have been given this "time apart" we call Lent—40 days and 40 nights (not counting Sundays—Sundays are always celebrations of the resurrection and, therefore, are "in" Lent, not "of" Lent). What are we to do with this "time apart?" My internship supervisor, Bill Hyllengren, liked to say that some Christians give up something for Lent as a practice of self-denial. Lutherans, he would say, give more. We give more of our time

in worship, attending midweek Lenten services in addition to Sunday worship. We give more money in extra offerings or charitable giving. We spend more time in prayer and spiritual devotion.

The important thing is that we observe the season of Lent in whatever ways are most meaningful to us, hopefully in ways that will draw us closer to Christ as we contemplate the immeasurable sacrifice he made in taking on our humanity, becoming one of us, taking our sins upon himself, and suffering crucifixion to atone for our sins, all so that God may bestow his grace on us, offering us forgiveness and granting us eternal life and salvation. We might start by asking, "How am I doing in my journey of faith? Where is my daily walk with Christ taking me?" Some people focus on outward acts, reflecting on how they have done at observing the Ten Commandments and following the teachings of Jesus. This will almost certainly result in remorse, repentance and amendment of life. That can be a good thing. But consider another approach. I recently preached on Jesus' Sermon on the Mount where he said, "You have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, 'You shall not murder,' and 'whoever murders shall be liable to judgment.' <sup>22</sup> But I say to you that if you are angry with a brother or sister, you will be liable to judgment, and if you insult a brother or sister, you will be liable to the council, and if you say, 'You fool,' you will be liable to the hell of fire." "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall not commit adultery.' But I say to you that everyone who looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery with her in his heart." Jesus when on with a few more examples. The point he was making is twofold: 1. Outward sins stem from inner thoughts and attitudes. Therefore, look inward in self-examination. Do no think for a minute that any amount of righteous actions can make you right with God. Sin has more to do with inner motivations than outward behavior. 2. Such inner reflection should drive us to the

mercy seat of God, seeking forgiveness. There we find grace to cover a multitude of sins.

So, where will your Lenten journey take you this year? It is good to examine yourself and strive to live a life worthy of God's love. But as you stand in the shadow of the cross, know that Christ died for you and me and everyone else who has ever lived because we are incapable of being right with God by our own efforts. Look at the cross and see the ultimate expression of God's love for you. That's what grace is all about. The season of Lent can be a truly meaningful and spiritually enriching "time apart" if it brings you to a greater understanding and appreciation of God's immeasurable grace.

## The Stewardship and Generosity Corner\_

The goal of Zion's Stewardship and Generosity Committee is to help God's people grow in their relationship with Jesus through the use of the time, talents, and finances God has entrusted to them.

The last Mark of Discipleship in this year-long focus on stewardship is "Study." This is Zion's Mission Statement for Study. "We envision a congregation that studies the Holy Scriptures and the principles of Christian faith in order to fulfill its great desire to learn more about its calling as disciples of Jesus and the gifts that God so graciously provides. Families will regularly use materials provided for Bible study at home, and groups within the congregation will regularly gather to study the Scriptures and these principles."

Until group Bible studies can be offered at the church under fulltime pastoral leadership, I've put together a list of items that may help us in pursuing individual, couple, or family study at home. These are simple steps – some more time-consuming than others. I encourage you to try one or more of them. I hope they will provide a sense of direction and offer an opportunity to grow in faith.

Read the Book of Psalms - one chapter per day. The Psalms express our praise to God for who he is and what he does. They also express our need of God in times of trial and our confidence that God will help.

Read the Book of Proverbs - one chapter per day. Proverbs are filled with advice on life and living. They are practical, not theoretical, and point the way to godly character and a fulfilled life. They focus on this life not the next.

Become more familiar with the Lutheran faith by delving into Luther's Small Catechism. Read one part per day, for example, one Commandment, one article of the Apostles' Creed, one petition of the Lord's prayer, etc. Contemplate Luther's explanations and think about what they mean for your life.

If you'd like to be entertained while learning let me recommend a few books written by Pastor Kelly A Fryer. These are books that we read and discussed with Pastor Keith several years ago.

"Reclaiming the 'L' Word – Renewing the Church from Its Lutheran Core", Reclaiming the 'C' Word – Daring to be Church Again", and the last one; "Reclaiming the 'E' Word – Waking Up to Our Evangelical Identity". I truly enjoyed reading these books and I hope you will as well.

You can also study scripture via the next three recommendations that come in the form of a daily devotion.

- "God Pause" a Daily Devotion from Luther Seminary. Subscribe to it, as I did, by entering "Luther Seminary" on the search engine line and then pick "God Pause." When you subscribe it will arrive in your inbox daily. It includes commentary and a prayer. No more searching for links.
- Prayer Faithfully from the Northern Great Lakes Synod. Go to <u>NGLSynod.org</u> and look for the "Prayer Faithfully" link. This will not arrive in your inbox daily.
- Go to the ELCA.org and then pick "Daily Bible Reading" on the website. Subscribe and this provides you a daily Bible verse mailed directly to your email address. It does not include commentary.
- 4. Go to "Enter the Bible" an online resource from Luther Seminary at <u>enterthebible.org</u>. This resource offers a summary, outline, background, introductory issues, and theological themes for each of the books in the Bible.

We all want to have a closer walk with our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Studying is a way of making that a reality.

- For Back to School we supplied over 2,000 items to 180 children including backpacks and school supplies and each child received a gift card to get a new outfit, shoes etc. for their first day of school.
- Our Coats for Kids drive distributed 473 items, (such as coats, snowpants, hats, mittens, boots, blankets, and books) to 108 children and adults. We continue to keep donations on hand for those that still come in and are cold.

#### **Building a Kin-Dom for the Community**

When Pepa Paniagua felt called to a job that didn't exist, she set about creating it. What resulted was the "kin·dom community," a new approach to a term adopted nearly 40 years ago.

An ecumenical partnership that includes the ELCA Northern Texas-Northern Louisiana Synod and the Presbyterian Church (USA), the kin·dom community says its mission is to be "an intentional, brave space for all people to explore and cultivate spirituality." The community is committed to inclusion, integration and love and to affirming all gender identities and sexual orientations. The 2-year-old community operates under the direction of Paniagua, who is a Presbyterian pastor, and a board that includes Irma Bañales, the synod's director for evangelical mission.

At this point in its evolution the community is united largely through the content and resources members access from its website. But this summer the community branched out to host its first kin·dom camp and provide LGBTQIA+ youth with a week of affirmation, celebration and fun.

Paniagua, who grew up in the San Francisco Bay Area as a "cradle Presbyterian," has spent most of the past two decades in Texas. Following seminary studies in Austin, she served a post-graduate residency in the Dallas-Fort Worth area and since 2008 has been a pastor in northern Texas, where she lives with her wife, Kelli. Knowing that people who don't fit into the hetero-sexual or cisgender boxes have often been hurt by churches and other faith groups, Paniagua felt called to create a model for ministries fully welcoming of the LGBTQIA+ community.

By April 2019 she was exploring possibilities with 1001 New Worshiping Communities, which helps pastors create and execute novel initiatives. By the following year, Paniagua was ready "to stop talking about it and start doing it. The goal was to be in

restaurants or bars or other community spaces. In this part of the country people have suffered a significant amount of religious trauma."

After four kin·dom community meetings the pandemic struck, forcing the group into a Zoom format. Ultimately community members decided they didn't want one more aspect of their lives happening via teleconference, so kin·dom was reconfigured as a creator and curator of video and other content that members can access as best fits their schedules.

kin·dom board member Corey Wallis, who was born and raised in Texas in a Southern Baptist environment. Now a communications specialist for Trinity Presbyterian Church in McKinney and a student at Brite Divinity School in Fort Worth, Wallis got involved with kin·dom to use her "privilege" to "invest in places that are safe and warm and welcoming."

"I'm a straight, cisgender white woman," she said. "Church has always felt comfortable to me, it's welcoming for folks who present like I do—but not for all Christians. My three closest friends are gay.

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# Stewardship Initiative\_

This month's stewardship focus is on study. It sounds so easy right? Sitting here in my house without others to guide my study and offer their opinions on the text, I find it isn't easy at all. I did a search to get some tips on studying the Bible. Here's what I found.



- 1. Begin your study with prayer seeking wisdom and understanding.
- 2. You don't have to start at the beginning. The Gospels are easier to understand than Daniel or Revelations.
- 3. Choose a topic relevant to you and your life grace, repentance, forgiveness, or strength.
- 4. Get to know a character John the Baptist, Moses, Mary Magdalen.
- 5. Write down the insights you glean while doing your individual study.
- 6. Read the same Bible verses in different versions of the Bible.
- 7. Read or share with a family member or friend via Zoom, Facetime, or email.
- 8. Look up what you don't understand. Some of the words in the Bible are not easy. With the Internet we have a plethora of insights available to us.
- 9. Pause and listen. It is important to search and study the word of God, but it is equally important to slow down, quiet your mind, and listen.

Learning from the Bible is a lifelong pursuit and one which pleases God.

Dear Lord, we know you want us to learn more about you, your kingdom, and your love. Place within our hearts a desire to take time with your word in the Bible and to read and contemplate it. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen

#### Turkey and Syria Rocked by Devasting Earthquakes.

The violent earthquake and dozens of powerful aftershocks that struck Turkey on February 6 have devastated families. The first was a magnitude 7.8 earthquake in south central Turkey, followed hours later by a magnitude 7.5 quake in the southeastern part of the country. The two quakes have devastated Turkey and Syria, collapsing thousands of buildings and damaging infrastructure. Over 2,000 people have been killed and thousands more have been injured, yet search-and-rescue efforts are only in the early stages.

Survivors of the quakes report that the ground shook so forcefully that it was difficult to stand. Terrified of another strong aftershock, people are remaining outside in freezing temperatures.

A lutheran World Relief Team is coordinating a response with its network of trusted local partners.
