From the Pastor's Desk

On May 27, 1973, I was ordained into the ministry of word and sacrament at my home congregation, Unity Lutheran Church, in Milwaukee's Bay View community. This congregation produced about a dozen pastors in their first fifty years. I was in my second year of confirmation when our former church body, the Lutheran Church in America, was organized through a merger of four synods of various German and Scandinavian backgrounds. At the same time, we called a new pastor, Rev. R. R. Belter, who had been the president of the former Wartburg Synod and whose presidency came to an end with the merger. I was in the first class he confirmed at Unity. He mentored me toward a call to ministry. Marilyn and I were the last couple he married just before he retired.

Marilyn and I were born in the same hospital, Milwaukee Lutheran Hospital, nine months apart. We were baptized, confirmed and married at Unity. We were married in July of 1969 following my graduation from Carthage College in Kenosha, WI. Following our wedding we headed to St. Paul, Minnesota where I attended Northwestern Lutheran Theological Seminary. Following ordination, I was called to serve Trinity Lutheran Church in Rice Lake, Wisconsin, as well as a small country church, Grace Lutheran, Brill, WI. After seven years serving that parish, I was called to Emmanuel, Menominee, MI where I served for thirty-three years until retirement in 2013. My ministry of 50 years has been a partnership with my life partner, Marilyn. I have been blessed to have her as my partner in worship leadership as organist and choir director, leader of the praise band and handbell choirs, as well as her leadership in a host of other congregational ministries throughout the course of my parish ministry. I am grateful for the generations of children she mentored, not only in choral singing, but in an understanding of and appreciation for worship. Plus, she has been my chief advisor and encourager.

It is fitting, then, that we were recognized for that partnership at the recent Assembly of the Northern Great Lakes Synod at NMU in Marquette. Bishop Katherine Finegan asked me to be her worship assistant at the opening service on

Thursday evening. She also asked if I would deliver a children's sermon as this was the first Synod Assembly ever to have children present. Marilyn and I were also given the opportunity to serve communion together. At the banquet on Friday evening, I was recognized for my 50th anniversary of ordination. In my brief talk I stated that I was somewhat amazed that I am still leading worship every Sunday, still baptizing, marrying and burying, even still teaching confirmation and enjoying those young people immensely. I am grateful that God is still using me, grateful for the Holy Spirit's guidance and support through 50 years of ministry, and grateful to have spent the 50th year of my ministry serving Zion as interim pastor. This seems fitting given the long association Marilyn and I have had with this fine congregation. Marilyn was one of Zion's organists for twenty-five years and choir director for three years. Being interim pastor involves not only serving the congregation's pastoral and spiritual needs during the interim, but preparing the congregation for calling your next pastor. I am hopeful that we will be able to celebrate that event in the not too distant future.

To that end, I am pleased that Bishop Finegan was elected on the first ballot to a second three-year term as bishop. She has our Ministry Site Profile in her possession, is working on our behalf, and will meet with our Congregation Council when she has a viable candidate to present for interview and consideration for call. Pray with me that the Holy Spirit will guide Bishop Finegan, Zion's Congregation Council, and Zion congregation in the call process.

One additional item of related news I will share with you is that our neighboring congregation, Our Savior's Lutheran Church, has entered into an agreement with Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Peshtigo, to share a pastor. Vicar Katy Tomlanovich, who has been serving Our Savior's, has completed her seminary education, is about to be ordained, and will seek a fulltime call. Rev. David Murphy, Pastor of Good Shepherd, will now serve both congregations. We pray God's blessing upon Pastor Murphy and the faithful people of Good Shepherd and Our Savior's congregations.

Just a few days ago, we gathered as a Synod at Northern Michigan University. Here is a brief recap with highlights and actions taken. 216 voting members were registered along with 50 or so visitors.

WORSHIP

- Thursday: The assembly began with a Spirit-filled Opening Worship. Using the space at NMU, we used two ballrooms to accommodate a bell choir, a vocal choir, a pastor band, vested clergy, deacons, and LLM's, a children's worship play space, and many NGLS voting members and guests gathered as Church to worship. <u>A video of that service is available</u> <u>here, on NMU's YouTube Channel.</u>
- Saturday: We began with the liturgy for Morning Prayer from the ELW. Thanks to Pr. Brenda Greenwald and Pr. Steve Gauger for leading the worship.

CHAPLAINS

RESOLUTIONS OF NOTE

- Given our changed financial reality and the desire for funding for Synod ministry projects, we voted to rescind a 2017 Resolution that established a policy that any funds in excess of \$150,000 be sent on to our Churchwide partners.
- At Synod Assembly 2023, 31.3% of the voting members were clergy. This is well within the parameters required by our constitution that at least 60% of voting members be of the laity. However, the time may come in the future when the combined voting members of retired and serving clergy exceeds 40%. A resolution was passed to ensure the constitution requirement of at least 60% lay voting members at fu-



ture synod assemblies. Know that for the foreseeable future, the 20 - 25 or so retired clergy who register will receive both voice and vote.

- 3. We passed a deficit budget.
- 4. Approved the Clergy Compensation Guidelines for 2024.

Synod Assembly 2024 will be Conference-based hybrid. Voting members and visitors will meet at a host church in your conference and we will be connected through Zoom. In anticipation of Synod Assembly 2025, please set aside the additional funds that will be needed to support your voting members and pastoral leaders for an in-person assembly.

It was wonderful to be together! I heard over and over again that people valued being in person. The worship, the conversations, the witness of how we are church together was both moving and meaningful. As the next six years begin, the synod council will meet for a visioning retreat in June to help clarify our goals and give direction. We pray for the Spirit's guidance as we discern next steps and future efforts.

Thank you again for privilege of serving as your bishop. We move forward in faith, together.

Haven of Hope Homeless Shelter_

Zion's Social Ministry Committee has started monthly collections again and we are asking for your help. We've compiled a list of pantries and shelters in our area and we will rotate through them during the year. Some months we will list specific needs so watch the newsletters for details.

In June we will be gathering housekeeping items for Haven of Hope Homeless Shelter on Mann St. in Marinette.

Individuals (male & female) are permitted to stay at the shelter up to 90 days. While living at the shelter they must seek employment and are encouraged to volunteer their service to other charitable groups. They also preform residential duties, food prep, cooking, cleaning, laundry, etc.

Items needed at Haven of Hope are: zipper-loc bags (storage, freezer, quart & gallon size), large garbage bags, toilet paper, facial tissue, plastic wrap, aluminum foil, dish soap, scrubbies for dishes and cleaning, kitchen & bathroom cleansers, furniture polish, laundry detergent, fabric softener.

Thank you for giving me the privilege to be a representative of Zion at the Northern Great Lakes Synod Assembly May 18-20 in Marquette. This was a brand-new experience for me, and I wasn't sure what to expect, so I kept an open mind. Reflecting on the jam-packed three days, I thought I would ask myself the same questions we use for "Dwelling in the Word":

- 1. What stood out to you? This was a mixture of people from across the region, but they came together with the common purpose and passion for their congregations and their faith.




It takes many willing individuals to keep our Synod, its congregations, programs, and ministries moving forward. We are blessed and are extremely thankful for all of them.

Lutheran Church in Rwanda

The ongoing construction of Rwanda's first Lutheran seminary is sparking excitement amongst church leaders, but with an important government deadline looming ahead, that excitement has been coupled with anxiety.

In 2018, the government of Rwanda proposed a law that all ordained pastors, across denominations, must have the equivalent of a bachelor's or master's degree in theology or education to continue to serve their congregations.

Part of the pastoral emergency stems from the difference in how Rwandan churches are led, said Evalister Mugabo, bishop of the Lutheran Church of Rwanda.

"You call them pastors," Mugabo said. "Here, we have evangelists and pastors. Evangelists are the people who are serving in their [congregations], but not ordained as pastors."

Right now, the LCR has 39 pastors, Mugabo said. But the church primarily is led by non-ordained evangelists, many of whom have been trained at Rwanda's Bible school, known as Theological Education and Leadership Development (TELD).

However, TELD is only a steppingstone for those who want to become ordained. What Rwanda desperately needs is its own seminary, Mugabo said – and fortunately, the LCR is in the process of building one.

"For Rwandan Lutheran evangelists, these new regulations are a surmounting challenge," Mugabo wrote in an email sent to Lutheran leaders around the globe. "It means traveling to study in other countries such as Tanzania. This is not only costprohibitive for nearly all evangelists, but it also entails the hardship of being away from their congregations, communities and families. Thus, we feel the Holy Spirit is calling us to establish [the Lutheran Theological and Leadership College]."

In 2017, the ELCA agreed to monetarily support the Bible school, and TELD's leadership development program swelled. A 3-year program culminating with a certificate in **Biblical studies was** quickly established that year, and in 2019, one graduate was able to join Iringa University in Tanzania to pursue a bachelor's degree in theology.

In the Rukira Parish,

membership jumped from 469 to 753 members after evangelists who had received training at TELD came back, said Ntidendereza David, a pastor and principal of TELD. Similarly, the Kirehe Parish saw its membership grow from 424 to 689 members.

While growing TELD has been a primary goal for years, word of the government's new regulations led the LCR to plan an expansion of its education system. Building and staffing a seminary is now of the utmost importance, said Mugabo.

In October 2019, a commemoration stone was laid on the land secured for the Lutheran Theological and Leadership College, Mugabo said. Soon after, an administration building was completed, and the foundation of a four-story classroom building was laid. Through your Mission Support dollars, the ELCA shares funding for these projects.

"LCR is a small but mighty church," said Daudi Msseemmaa, the ELCA regional representative in East Africa. "As it grows, it needs more pastors and evangelists, and they need to have the skills to support the spiritual and emotional needs of congregations carrying the generational weight of violence, displacement, and even reconciliation from their histories.
