### From the Pastor's Desk

I am writing this article one day after observing the holiday known as Juneteenth Day. Although Juneteenth Day is our newest national holiday, it commemorates an event that took place 158 years ago. It is a recognition of delayed freedom. The Emancipation Proclamation, declaring freedom for slaves in the states that were in rebellion, went into effect on January 1, 1863. However, the Texas government denied liberation to its slaves until the Confederacy had lost the Civil War, and even for a while after that. On the morning of June 19, 1865, Union Army Major General Gordon Granger rode into Galveston to take command of the Union troops deployed there and announced to the slaves there that they were liberated. In essence, they had been set free by proclamation, but they didn't know it and couldn't experience it for two and a half years.

This leads me to think about people today who are liberated and don't know it. I am talking about people for whom Christ died but don't know that they have been set free. Martin Luther stated it simply in his explanation of the 2nd article of the Apostles' Creed: "[Jesus Christ] has redeemed me, a lost and condemned human being. He has purchased and freed me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil, not with gold or silver but with his holy, precious blood and his innocent suffering and death." There is no greater bondage than to sin, death and the power of the devil. By his atoning death on the cross, Christ set us free from this bondage. Yet, there are many people who do not know that they have been set free. Some know, if for no other reason than by a guilty conscience, that they are sinful, but do not know, understand or believe that Jesus Christ died for their sins and set them free. Some do not know or acknowledge that they are sinners in need of forgiveness. The gospel (good news) has either not been proclaimed to them, or they have heard it but do not accept it.

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The primary message of the Bible (God's word that leads to salvation) is one of law and gospel. The law, summarized by the Ten Commandments, points out to us that we are sinful and incapable of keeping God's law to perfection. Paul writes in Romans 3, "For 'no human being will be justified in [God's] sight' by deeds prescribed by the law, for through the law comes knowledge of sin." Paul goes on to say, "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." The gospel is the good news that, as Paul continues to write, "they are now justified by [God's] grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus." Freedom from "sin, death and the power of the devil" comes to all who take to heart both the condemnation announced by the law and the liberation proclaimed by the gospel. To not accept this truth is like being set free, yet still living in bondage.

We read in John 8:31-34, "Then Jesus said to the Jews who had believed in him, 'If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free.' They answered him, 'We are descendants of Abraham and have never been slaves to anyone. What do you mean by saying, "You will be made free"?' Jesus answered them, 'Very truly, I tell you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin. The slave does not have a permanent place in the household; the son has a place there forever. So if the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed." This liberating truth is so well expressed in a prayer I happened to read in my daily devotions on June 19, Juneteenth Day. It is by John Baillie (1886-1960), a Scottish minister and seminary professor, whose book, A Diary of Private Prayer, is considered a classic. I will paraphrase the prayer in contemporary language. "O God, who sees and knows all things, give me grace, I pray, so that I may know You and see You, that in knowing You, I may know myself even as I am most perfectly known by You, and in seeing You, may see myself as You see me. Give me today some clear vision of my life as it appears to You in Your holiness. Show me my own smallness and Your infinite

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greatness. Show me my own sin and Your perfect righteousness. Show me my own lovelessness and Your exceeding love. Yet in Your mercy, show me also how, small as I am, I can take refuge in Your greatness; how, sinful as I am, I may lean upon Your righteousness; and how, loveless as I am, I may hide myself in Your forgiving love. Cause my thoughts to dwell much today on the life and death of Jesus Christ my lord, so that I may see all things in the light of the redemption which You have granted me in His name. Amen."

May this prayer be a guide & an inspiration to you as you live out your freedom in Christ each and every day. Have a blessed, relaxing and refreshing summer!

- Meals that are ready to eat such as Chef Boyardee; Dinty Moore; Spaghetti O's; canned fish, chicken, ham; cracker or pretzel snack packs; Pop Tarts; granola bars; breakfast bars, fruit roll ups; beef jerky; trail mix; nuts; dried fruit; and fruit and vegetable juices.
- Meals that just need water and a microwave: soups, cereals, oatmeal cups. Many companies make individual serving cups like: A Taste of Thai Noodles, Rice-A-Roni, Idahoan potatoes, Minute Rice.

### Letter from Bishop Finegan

Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. ~John 15:4



Dear Northern Great Lakes Synod, In early December of 2017, I was out in our front yard wrapping Christmas lights around a limb of a tree. The limb was about 10 feet off the ground, and I was standing on a ladder, perhaps the third step down, in order to stretch the lights over and

under the branch that extended horizontally. Finished with that particular section, I took one step down, but instead of the ladder remaining firmly stationary, it moved toward me. If I did nothing, I would fall to the ground from a painful height on my back. So I grabbed the limb of the tree and pulled toward it, thinking that this would stabilize the ladder and bring us both back upright.

No such luck. Instead of righting itself, the ladder fell away beneath me leaving me to cling briefly to the limb before falling to the ground. In my mind, in that slow motion moment, I felt like I could actually choose where I fell, like a kind of gymnastic dismount from the parallel bars. But in reality, I dropped like a bag of potatoes. And somewhere in the confusion of lights, ladder, and branch, the two fingers of my right hand were caught and pulled out, down, and around with a distinctive crunching sound that made me think of someone snacking on a mouthful of potato chips.

I had broken the bone in my hand that was connected to the ring finger and disrupted the surrounding bones and soft

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tissue. After several weeks in a splint and then cast, I was given my hand back, only to realize that in that brief time, my brain had decided that my hand no longer belonged to my body. It was still attached of course, but not in a way that gave it life and function. The physical therapist called it Chronic Reactive Pain Disorder. In short, my hand could no longer work as a hand should. I could not write or type, play piano or grab hold of things. It was a swollen useless thing. My brain, and my hand, needed to be retrained and reconnected to meaningful communication with the body, so that the brain would tell the body to send healing and reconnect the signals to the muscles of my hand.

So, what about meaningful connection in the body...the BODY... of Christ? What needs to be retrained? What needs to reawakened for life and increased function as we are Church together?

My hand was brought back to life as I watched the 2018 Winter Olympics. While watching gymnasts who actually knew how to land a dismount, I put my hand in hot water for two minutes and then in ice water for 30 seconds – back and forth, night after night. Then exercises, and physical therapy, and more tricks on the brain to get my hand to function in a way that was useful to the body.

Jesus, thankfully, does not suggest that we all dunk ourselves in tubs of hot and cold water to be reconnected as a body. Rather, Jesus talks about connectedness as abiding in him in order to bear fruit. And the way that we abide is by being in relationship with him. And that relationship is conveyed to us in at least two ways: through study of scripture and through relationship with each other as the body of Christ. Again...BODY.

When the Synod Council met in retreat June 9 -10, we agreed to

initiate an effort for us to abide, as a whole Synod, as 79 congregations spanning hundreds of miles and in a variety of communities and contexts, by dwelling on the same passages of scripture over a 12-month period.

We will abide with Jesus by dwelling in the Word. Each congregation will receive 12 different passages of scripture, one for each month. And at each council meeting and quilter group, at each Sunday School and youth group meeting, at each and every gathering that month, people from across the synod will dwell with the same text. No preparation is needed. No theological degree is required. Very simply:

- 1. Invite one person to read the text aloud.
- 2. Consider silently the following:
  - a. What do you notice?
  - b. What questions do you have?
  - c. Where might the Holy Spirit be leading us?
- 3. Then have another person read the text aloud again.
- 4. Share your thoughts about the questions with each other.
- 5. Close with prayer.

That's it.

We shall abide. And in abiding, in dwelling with the presence of Christ in the word, and considering the work of the Spirit with each other, we will connect with the one who makes us one, who gathers us as a BODY to embody the love of Christ in the world and for the world.

In addition, all are invited to join the Synod Council as we dwell in the word, via Zoom, the **first Thursday of the month**, starting Thursday **September 7 at 7:30 pm ET / 6:30 pm CT**. The Zoom link will be available on our website and in E-Notes and you can add it to your online calendars.

The impact of being disconnected, of having the body forget who it is connected to and why, cannot be overestimated. We need each other to be the body of Christ, and we need the Holy Spirit of Christ to clarify our mission and purpose as that Body. By dwelling in the word together, we shall abide...in Christ, in the Word, in the presence of Christ in each other.
