From the Pastor's Desk

October 22nd was Time-Talent-Treasure Sunday at Zion. Zion members joined their Christian brothers and sisters throughout the Northern Great Lakes Synod and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America in processing to the altar and laying their pledge cards before the Lord as a thank-offering, an expression of gratitude, a symbol of faithfulness, and a vow of support of the ministries through which we, as the church, do the work of God in our respective communities and throughout the world. It was a moving worship experience. In response to several requests, and as a concluding thought for our month-long stewardship emphasis, I am going to share a portion of my sermon from October 1st that kicked off our stewardship campaign. The following is my personal reflection:

I have been blessed in life in many ways, but one of the blessings for which I am most grateful is having had parents who were people of faith, who brought me to the baptismal font when I was but a month old where God claimed me as his own and gave me the promise of eternal life in Christ, parents who made good on their promises to bring me up in the faith, who brought me to worship and Sunday School regularly, who set an example of active involvement in the life and mission of the church, and who demonstrated faithful stewardship of time, talents and treasures.

In my childhood and youth, I went through the various steps in the process of growth as a child of God—Sunday School, Confirmation, First Communion, and the like—but here's the thing—I saw these things as rewards for accomplishments on my part. Keep in mind that I grew up in an era when gold stars were awarded for things like regular attendance in Sunday School, memorizing the names of the books of the Bible, and committing Luther's Small Catechism to memory. Being an active part of the church, it seemed to me, was a merit-based system. For example, back in the day we did not

receive Communion until we were confirmed. We were confirmed on Palm Sunday and received our First Communion on Maundy Thursday. Communion, I thought then, was a reward I received for passing all those tests on the catechism and getting confirmed. In fact,



confirmation was an achievement that entitled me to several privileges.

Once confirmed, I could join Luther League, what we called the church's youth program in those days. I earned the right to get to do the fun things.

When I was confirmed, I received my own adult box of offering envelopes. That was a big deal to me. I had earned an advanced status. Before Commitment Sunday in the fall, I sat at the dining room table with my parents and filled out my very own pledge card just like they did. I would have pledged 25 or 50 cents a week of my meager allowance. That couldn't have meant much to the church in terms of supporting its operating budget, but it sure meant a lot to me. It made me feel important and valued. I was learning to practice proportionate giving and first fruits giving before I even knew what that meant.

Another reward confirmation brought me was that I could serve on a committee and attend an annual meeting and vote on church business. I had earned that privilege. All well and good. I got involved. I did my part. When asked, I said "yes" and I showed up. I followed through. But I had the wrong idea. I saw all these things as a series of rewards. I had earned the right. I had achieved the status.

I don't know when the transition took place, but in time I came

to regard these things, not as rewards, but gifts and blessings from God that gave me joy, purpose and fulfillment. This came, in part, I think, because the church changed its perspective. For example, Communion was seen, not as a reward for being confirmed, but a stepping stone that would strengthen the young believer on the path toward confirmation and, therefore, offered at an earlier age with meaningful instruction. The church, in time, also moved toward involving children in church activities in a variety of ways as early as possible.

Whatever the trends and whatever the reasons, I am grateful that I came to see the church and its functions, not as a merit-based system, but a grace-based system. I am grateful that I came to see the things I have been called to do to serve God and God's people not as rewards, but as gifts and blessings bestowed on me by a gracious God that have enriched my life.

The Stewardship and Generosity Corner_

The goal of Zion's Stewardship and Generosity Committee is to help God's people grow in their relationship with Jesus through the use of the time, talents, and finances God has entrusted to them.

About two months ago, a friend contacted me about a prayer class which was going to be held at Emmanuel Lutheran. She wanted to know if I would be interested in attending with her. As it turns out we couldn't attend the class together because of our diverging schedules; however, being called by God through her, I decided to attend. After signing up, I began thinking about the prayers that I had been saying. I decided that lately they were mostly by rote; I wasn't feeling totally comfortable with them — I wasn't connecting with God the way I had previously or the way I wanted.

The Prayer Class, led by Emmanuel Lutheran's Interim Pastor Christine Olson, began with the class developing a Group Covenant and a listing of what they hoped to get out of the prayer group. My own personal goals were:

- to develop a better relationship with God through prayer.
- to learn how to focus better when praying and stop my mind from wandering off.
- to learn different ways to pray.

We were instructed to create a prayer spot – a special place in our home that is only used for prayer. It could be as simple as a chair next to a small table or a special room with someplace to sit and a side table. On the table would be a Bible, journal or note pad with pen or pencil, a candle to light or perhaps a cross to view if preferred - but don't clutter the space. We were cautioned that we may need to try a couple of different spots to find the perfect one, especially if we have a spouse or children to distract us.

We would also need a timer or an alarm for our prayer spot. These prayer exercises should last 15-20 minutes, but

no more than 30 minutes each. If we didn't have a timer or an alarm, we would be worried about how much time had passed – too little – too much.

We were to choose a time of day at which to pray every day. This could be a specific time on the clock, 7:30, noon, etc., or a time based upon our own routine, such as with morning coffee, right after lunch, etc. We were advised that establishing the perfect time might take a few days to determine as well. Then every day, at the established time, we were to go to our prayer spot, get comfortable, and rest in silence for a few moments asking God to be with us and to speak to us through the prayer exercise.

I'm now 4 weeks into it and I'm astounded by what I am uncovering. Starting next month, I will share with you the different types of prayer that I am being taught — each one being vastly different from the other. I thought my prayer life was pretty good, but over time it had evolved into something I think is truthfully - pitiful. I knew in my heart of hearts that I really needed to spend more time in prayer - in conversation with and listening to God, and this provides me that avenue. After these few weeks, practicing what I have been taught, I find myself having more frequent conversations with God. My mind doesn't travel as much a it did, and I can relax in God's presence far better than previously.

I have eight more classes to go, and I'm sure much more to discover and learn. With God's guidance I humbly ask that my prayer life will continue to grow.

News from the Synod!_

Dear People of the Northern Great Lakes Synod,

Grace and peace to you!

As you may know, the work of Christ through the Northern Great Lakes Synod (NGLS) is funded by the generosity of our 79 congregations. Mission Support from NGLS congregations, sometimes called Benevolence, is shared with the Churchwide Organization of the ELCA to make wider and deeper AMERICA ministry possible, as well as cover the basic costs of NGLS staff salaries, benefits, and the light bill at the Synod office. Like our congregations, the Synod staff is intentional about being good stewards of the resources entrusted to us. Bills are paid and obligations are met. What if we had the resources to do more?

In conversation with the Synod Council, the hope was expressed that we have an annual fund drive that creates a Synod Ministry Fund. This fund is not an Endowment that creates a corpus from which a yearly disbursement supports ministry. Rather, the hope for the Synod Ministry Fund is that every year it will provide needed financial support for current congregational and Synod ministry efforts. What new thing would your congregation do if it only had the money? What collaborative effort could be possible with adequate financial support? What innovative ministry, event, initiative, or vision could come into being if only the money was there?

On Giving Tuesday (November 28, 2023), our inaugural Synod Ministry Fund Campaign will begin and extend through December 31, 2023. Geared toward the individual giver, the hope is to build up a fund before the end of this year from which monies will be distributed for ministry projects the following year. The goal is for resources that are nimble and accessible; gathered in one year and sent out the next.


