#### **REPORT OF THE PASTOR FOR 2024**

Dear blessed and valued members of Zion,

The snow that is falling today as I write this report tells us that it is January. The church year calendar that guides our weekly worship gatherings tells us that it is the season of Epiphany. The readings from the gospel of Mark focus on Jesus calling his disciples. The message these texts convey is that we are all called to discipleship to be followers of Jesus in all the seasons of our lives. What an incredible blessing and honor, to be called, commissioned and sent to represent our Lord and Savior, the Redeemer of a broken world, in our worship, our work, our families, our relationships, our civic engagement. In the time I have served as your interim pastor, I have become keenly aware that the people of Zion have a clear understanding of this calling. It flavors your worship, directs your ministries, motivates your generosity, encourages your volunteerism, and emboldens your witness. It is a joy and privilege to serve you and work with you.

Zion's Caring Ministry Team currently comprises Pastor Doug Schoen, Pat Rondeau, Sarge Rudell, Lori Despins, Judy Stehle, Jane Landenberger, and I.

The team made 97 visits in 2023 to 20 individuals. Pastor Doug, who is our quarter-time interim pastor, also made at least a dozen visits and additionally, numerous telephone calls to those who are hospitalized or in need of special pastoral care. Jane Landenberger sent out 67 cards recognizing a vast number of lifetime occurrences.

If you, a family member, or congregational friend are ill, hospitalized, or in need of assistance and want to utilize a service provided by the Caring Ministry, please contact the church office at 715-735-7898. We absolutely do not want anyone to feel forgotten or worse yet ignored when they are ill or hospitalized. We sincerely care and truly want to share God's love and care with you. We will contact you to make arrangements prior to visiting.

To all of you who serve on the Caring Ministry team, thank you for giving yourself and your time in 2023. What you do makes an enormous difference in the life of the people you minister to. They feel included, cared for, and remembered by their congregation. Your faithfulness to them is deeply valued not only by those you visit but by me.

As we move into year 2024, we hope to continue to bring God's loving word and care to all those we visit and commune.

#### **HARVEST OF HOPE COMMUNITY GARDEN**

The garden is available to congregation members and the community at large. There is space to grow vegetables, fruits or flowers for personal use or for donation to food pantries. It provides an opportunity for Zion and the community to socialize and work together outdoors. From gardening novice to master gardener, all are welcome to participate. Participants share experiences and ask questions.

Approximately half of the space is composed of raised beds, each bed measuring 4-feet by 8-feet. Approximately half of the space is open garden space that is assigned to gardeners. This past year saw the addition of two 2 feet by 8 feet raised planters for those who have difficulty kneeling or bending. There is room for additional raised beds and raised planters if/as needed. Gardening tools are available in the shed located north of the garden, although most people have their own tools. Water is available throughout the growing season via a hose. Pesticides and insecticides are not allowed, but the garden is not considered organic. Composted manure is made available each spring to improve the soil. Gardeners may provide other soil improvements at their choice.

Gardeners had a very good production year in 2023 despite unusual weather patterns. If you would like to participate in 2024, contact me at 715-732-0161 for more information. Prior year gardeners are given first option to have the spaces they used in the prior year, then newcomers can choose from the remaining areas. More raised beds or raised planters can be made if there is enough demand.

Monetary donations are accepted as there are ongoing costs for fence and raised bed repairs, or building new raised beds and/or planters. Two individuals have done most of the mowing within the garden but new help with mowing would be appreciated. Additional mowers would be asked to provide a mower as well.

#### 2023 Report to Association Congregations

**Greetings from Fortune Lake!** 

We pray for your faith community and are grateful for your partnership. As you reflect on the past year and discern where the Holy Spirit is calling next, I present the following reflections from camp: 2023 was another blessed year for Fortune Lake, our 93rd year of operation! Here are some of the highlights:

- We served 476 summer campers of all ages through our onsite programs and partnered
  with many of you to deliver 9 day camp programs in your communities. The theme of Holy
  Trinity, Wholly Loved was impactful on both staff and campers.
- Our rental and retreat usage is booming, with 2023 being perhaps the best year on record!
- Our dedicated year-round team of 4 full-time and 3 part-time staff continues to work hard to
  provide a comfortable experience for all people. Our summer staff, including 4 internationals,
  was vibrant, robust, and energetic. We are now recruiting young adult staff for Summer 2024.
- The property is in beautiful shape, with many significant upgrades made possible by last year's CoVantage Cares Giving Tuesday Campaign. Duplexes have all receive new boilers, windows, and roofs. Emanuel Lodge has a new facade and fire alarm system. The Dining Hall has new windows and a commercial range and ovens. We'll wrap up upgrades in 2024. Additionally, our waterfront has a gorgeous new accessible pier from a private donor! Next spring we will complete the accessibility upgrade with an improved pathway from the sauna to the beach, through an ELCA grant.
- Financially, we are holding our own, despite the significant increase in the cost of food, basic supplies, and utilities. Our donors and association congregations have continued to show their commitment to this ministry. One-time donations, monthly electronic withdrawals, and legacy gifts are deeply appreciated and used to ensure that God's work continues. If you are in a position to give above and beyond your congregational giving, know that Fortune Lake will use your gift efficiently.
- Our Total Inclusion Task Force has worked to help us be more welcoming to people who
  have historically been marginalized in Christian camping spaces. Please visit our website to

- The Board of Directors recently updated our mission statement. It reads, "Seeking to connect faith and life, we provide a welcoming space for all people to experience God, community, and nature." During our June meeting the group discussed the applications that were received for the 2023 year. We were very pleased to be able to make a total distribution of \$7,600.00.

The following groups were chosen based on their wishes on the grant application form, and then were formally approved by Zion's Congregation Council at their June meeting: \$250 to Menominee Animal Shelter; \$300 to Cans of Hope; \$650 to A Place for Max; \$2,300 to Abundant Life; \$100 to Sew for Missons; \$1,000 to Biehl Bridges; \$1,000 to Northern Great Lakes Youth Ministry; \$1,000 to Zion Lutheran's AV Improvement Fund.

We will be inviting two of these groups to our worship service in late February, or early March 2024, to update the congregation on their use of these funds.

#### **Zion Lutheran Church 2024 Budget Comments**

An expense budget is adopted annually with no formal receipts budget. For budgeting purposes, we assume no increase or decrease in receipts from the previous year.

If the 2024 budgeted expenses are compared to the 2023 receipts, considering our general fund balance including the unused pastor salary, the proposed budget would result in an increase in our general fund of \$104,153 with the same receipts as 2023.

#### Benevolences:

Items are budgeted at actual or approximately 2023 amounts.

#### Salaries and Perquisites:

- Budgeted wages were increased 4% from 2023 with the exception of the Treasurer annual stipend increase of \$520
- Substitute and interim pastors \$1,500 are based on one substitute per month for 2023.
- Pastor's salary for 2024 was based on Synod guidance on 2023 budget and remains the same.

#### Other Operating Expenses:

Items are budgeted at actual 2023 except for the following:

- Local benevolences (Which including such things as NEWCAP) was budgeted same as 2023, but is based on previous years donations)
- Gas and electric is budgeted based on current monthly WPS budgeted amount of \$739 per month. This is higher than 2023 budgeted amount and lower than 2023 actual.
- Professional expenses is budgeted at 2023 budgeted amount.
- Worship and office supplies were budgeted at the 2023 budgeted amount.
- Miscellaneous was budgeted at the 2023 *budgeted* amount.
- Snow shoveling was combined into snow removal as our current provider of snow plowing is taking over all removal of snow. \$2,588 amount calculated by adding 2023 budgeted amounts of snow shoveling and snow plowing. And line item renamed Snow removal (plow, salt, shovel)
- Heating/plumbing repairs/maintenance is budgeted at the 2023 budgeted amount.
- Boiler payments are budgeted based on \$1,105 monthly loan payment. Additional donations would reduce the principle of the loan but are not budgeted. 2023 actual included \$1,378 in donations toward principle.
- AV Project is budgeted at \$45,482 based on quotes. This amount is offset by AV Capital Improvement Fund balance of \$36,590 and \$8,892 funds from the Parsonage Proceeds Fund which was transferred to Capital Improvement Fund for future use. Any 2024 donations for AV would also be applied to this project.
- Sign Project is budgeted at \$4,000 based on quote. This amount is offset by Unrestricted Capital Improvement Funds.

Dear People of the Northern Great Lakes Synod,

As we begin the Year of our Lord 2024, I share with you the scripture focus of our Synod for the next three years. The above verse from Paul's first letter to the church at Corinth is an admonition to those who would make a distinction between baptism at the hands of one leader against another, as if baptism ties the newly initiated to the baptizer rather than to the one in whose name we are baptized. Paul asserts that the life of faith is about more than one believer or baptizer, rather all believers are part of the life cycle of ministry; one planting seeds- for the next one to nurture- for the next one to enjoy the growth given by the grace of God, which in turn enables seed planting for future ministry.

Together, all of us are Seed Sowers with a common purpose, and there is blessing in understanding the impact we can have in different seasons of ministry.

For the year of our Lord 2024, we will lean into what it means to "plant." I confess, I do not always have patience for planting. When I have been frustrated at a lack of response for a given effort, I often hear the reassuring word, "but you planted seeds! Who knows how those seeds will bear fruit in the future." While this is true and I am glad to be reminded, I would much rather see the fruits of my labor now.

If only ministry could be more like mowing the lawn! One makes the effort, sees the rows where the grass has been cut and where it still needs a trim, and when it's all done, there is a sense of satisfaction as I can see what has been accomplished. There is an immediate return on the labor and time invested.

So often, ministry is not like this.

And yet planting is so important! There is no harvest without planting. There is no fruit of our labor. There is no passing on the faith, teaching, raising up leaders, building relationships in and out of our congregations.

We give thanks to God for the growth we enjoy from seeds that were planted long ago. Each of us has a story to share of who passed the faith on to us and how. Who was it that planted seeds of faith in you? How were they watered? And each one of our ministry efforts began somewhere. Who planted the seeds of your congregation? Of LWR quilts and food pantries? We celebrate that others have laid a foundation for ministry, and still others have built upon it. But only God gives the growth.

This year, as we focus on planting, we not only enjoy the fruits of what others have planted, but we take our turn to plant seeds for future ministry, future generations, future Church. We plant seeds for fruit that we may never see and for a future Church that may

be very different from the one we know. Yet we plant, trusting that God will give the growth.
