#### From the Pastor's Desk



A basic tenet of our Christian faith is the belief that Jesus Christ is both divine and human, both God and man. In the Apostles' Creed we confess, "I believe in Jesus Christ, [God's] only Son, our Lord." In writing his Small Catechism, Martin Luther made this more personal stating, "I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father in

eternity, and also a true human being, born of the virgin Mary, is my Lord." In the seasons of Epiphany and Lent, we heard acclamations of Jesus' divinity. At his baptism, the voice from heaven was heard to proclaim, "You are my Son, the Beloved." At his transfiguration, the Father's voice was heard again, this time by the disciples, saying the same words. When Jesus asked his disciples who they thought he was, Simon Peter spoke up and declared, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God!" That Jesus Christ is the eternal Son of God, the second person of the Trinity, is proclaimed throughout scripture.

While Jesus' divinity is clearly on display in the events of Holy Week, his human nature is also very much in evidence. The introductory notes for Palm/Passion Sunday state, "Mark's gospel presents Jesus in his complete human vulnerability: agitated, grieved, scared, forsaken." Indeed, we see the human side of Jesus play out in the events of this week. He rides into Jerusalem on the foal of a donkey in a display of humility and peacefulness. He is enraged when he sees how the money changers and sellers of sacrificial animals have corrupted the temple. Meeting with his disciples on Thursday to celebrate the Passover meal, he teaches them humility and servanthood by kneeling and washing their feet. Later that evening, he goes to the Garden of Gethsemane to pray and expresses his

agony and desire for escape as he faces the betrayal, torture and death by crucifixion he knows awaits him, yet prayers for God's will to be done through him, nevertheless. On the cross, he cries out in agony, not just over physical pain and suffering, but due to an overwhelming sense of abandonment. At the same time, he speaks words of forgiveness and lovingly provides for the care of his grieving mother. Every human emotion that we possess is displayed by our Lord in the events we remember during Holy Week in worship, devotional reading and prayer.

Observing Holy Week in its fullness, especially by participating in our services of worship on Palm/Passion Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday, ought to give us a deep sense of awareness and appreciation of Jesus' human and divine nature. This is the eternal Son of God setting aside his divine glory and power, taking our human nature upon himself and with it our sins, our weaknesses, our emotions, our struggles—all it means to be human. This shows us that we have a God who understands us and understands all that it means to be human. This is a God who stands with us in everything we experience in life--every temptation, every achievement, every loss, every gain, every fear, every joy. God can relate to all of it because he experienced all of it through Christ Jesus, his Son.

I pray this may have renewed meaning for you as you participate in our Holy Week worship services and as you reflect on all that our Savior Jesus did for you in the events of Holy Week. May this contribute to you having a joyful, hope-filled Easter!

#### The Stewardship and Generosity Corner\_

The goal of Zion's Stewardship and Generosity Committee is to help God's people grow in their relationship with Jesus through the use of the time, talents, and finances God has entrusted to them.

The focus for the month of April is ENCOURAGE. Specifically, we want to encourage you to grow in your faith to God.

When a flower seed is planted in loamy soil it is a tiny little thing that looks like it won't produce much of anything. But apply a little sunshine and water and in 2-3 months you'll have a pot filled with beautiful, scented flowers.

Each of us represents a flower seed. We also need sunshine (encouragement) and a little water (knowledge) to help us grow in our faith in God.

# **1 Thessalonians 5:11** — Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing.

I was baptized and raised in the Roman Catholic Church in a time when manmade rules and regulations were the norm. For instance, there was venial and mortal sin and if you died in a state of sin you were doomed to Purgatory or even Hell; when a person died relatives could pay to light a candle, have prayers or a Mass said in your name thereby wanting to get you out of Purgatory sooner; you could not partake of Holy Communion without first confessing your sins to a priest and doing penance; eating meat on Fridays or Holy Days of Obligation was a sin; skipping Mass was a sin; and precious babies who died without Baptism went to Limbo!! I had a problem with these teachings, still do, and as a result I left the Roman Catholic Church in 1974. Leaving wasn't a problem but ridding myself of the faith of my youth, whereby I had to earn God's love, took more than a bit of doing. For me, that religious affiliation was hopeless. I would never be good enough to earn God's love. I almost walked away from organized religion, but God intervened. I got pregnant. I wanted to have the baby Baptized, but not Roman Catholic.

In my search I discovered the Lutheran Church. It has taken 50 years to get past what I learned in my youth, but thanks to Zion's membership and a large group of Lutheran pastors my perspective and knowledge about faith has been reshaped to offer me hope for a brighter future today and even in death.

In N.T. Wright's book, "Surprised by Hope – Rethinking Heaven, the Resurrection, and the Mission of the Church," I learned that one of the ways God brings his kingdom, "on earth as it is in heaven," is through his people – you and me. We are invited to be vehicles God can use to bring his love, justice, and beauty to a world desperate for all these things. We're told the hope of heaven is not something we are waiting for, but it is what we enter each day. To be an encouragement to others helps us to achieve that goal.

# **Philippians 2:4** — Each of you, be interested not only in your own things but also in those of others.

Dear Lord, help each of us to grow in our love and understanding of you as we journey through our lives. Help us to encourage one another and to share our faith with one another thereby helping that growth to develop and bloom.
