Reflections

"But speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and knit together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love. So then, putting away falsehood, let all of us speak the truth to our neighbors, for we are members of one another. Be angry, but do not sin; do not let the sun go down on your anger, and do not make room for the devil. Therefore, be imitators of God, as beloved children and live in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us."

~Ephesians 4:15-16, 25-26; 5:1-2a

A friend from seminary once noted when he moved from California to Iowa that the different seasons of the Mid-West were attractive because it made you appreciate the nice weather that much more. I agree. Dare I say it, without the cold in winter, the warm summers would not be enjoyed as much. And without the humidity of summer, the cooler temperatures of fall and winter would not be as welcome.

A comment in a colleague's newsletter article a few years back had struck me as I was reading it. He pointed out how sometimes we may not like Lent because of "all the talk about sin and mortality," and yet it still happens, calling "us to take seriously our brokenness and mortality and renew our faith through repentance and service." It got me to thinking about the fact that without Lent and the Three Days, without the recognition of our own death, Easter would lose its meaning and effectiveness; it would truly be just another holiday, not a holy-day. And in the same way, if there was no Easter, Lent would merely be another exercise in self-discipline with no hope-filled and transformed life.

In both of these observations, without one aspect, the worth of the other is not as visible or respected. Now I realize that these are very simplified examples, but it seems that many things in our world today are so divisive rather than complimentary,

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which is disheartening. Many times, rather than seeing the value that the opposite can bring into our lives, we immediately move into our defensive positions and cut off any possibility of growth and renewal. I am not advocating this should always be the way. There are times when we need to stand our ground. But this begs the question, what are we truly praying for and proclaiming when we say Christ makes us one? Is it just lip service? Is it more homogeneity, with others conforming to be like us, that we're seeking? Or maybe, truthfully, we don't desire unity. As Paul stresses in his letters and as my colleague had noted, we are called to be an alternative community. Jesus Christ has died and rose for us, forgiving us for our sins and setting us apart for the work and mission of God to share the Lord's love and grace freely granted to all. Hallelujah!

Mental Health Corner_

<u>Dementia-Part 1</u> (from the National Institute on Aging, https://www.nia.nih.gov/health/alzheimers-and-dementia/what-dementia-symptoms-types-and-diagnosis)

Dementia is the loss of cognitive functioning—thinking, remembering, and reasoning—to such an extent that it interferes with a person's daily life and activities. Some people with dementia cannot control their emotions, and their personalities may change. Dementia ranges in severity from the mildest stage, when it is just beginning to affect a person's functioning, to the most severe stage, when the person must depend completely on others for basic activities of daily living, such as feeding oneself. Dementia affects millions of people and is more common as people grow older (about one-third of all people age 85 or older may have some form of dementia) but it is not a normal part of aging. Many people live into their 90s and beyond without any signs of dementia. There are several different forms of dementia, including Alzheimer's disease, which is the most common.

Congregation Council Highlights

The Congregational Council met on April 8, at 6:30 p.m.

Approval Of March Minutes: Pastor Amanda and Mark Swenson (amended) a motion that was made by Laura Chaltry to allow online access for the Mission Investment Fund to LeeAnn Limberg and Kim Swenson (Treasurer of Endowment Committee) seconded by Pastor Amanda passed via online vote.

Pastor's Report: March 2025 Average Attendance was 69. We will be phasing out the current welcome and prayer slips; new welcome cards will be put in the pews for visit requests, change of address etc. Prayer requests will either be welcomed aloud or quietly in the heart. Pastoral Acts in March include the death of Marilyn Gould, 10 home visits, and various committee meetings.

March Financial Reports

- A motion was made regarding the Ken and Thea Swenson Fund/Future Fund, because the M&M Community Foundation decided to stop the Future Fund, the title will now just be The Ken and Thea Swenson Youth Fund and Community Camper Scholarships will come from that.
- General Fund: Balance increase of \$4,452. Disbursements: \$906 for snow removal; \$3,137 for insurance; \$5,101 sent to NGLS. Current balance: \$171,075
- Capital Improvement Fund: Additions \$2000 for A/V; \$5 for boiler; and \$360 unrestricted. Disbursements Payment to Franks \$100. Overall decrease for March \$1,097. Balance is currently \$90,146.
- Memorial Fund: Transfer of \$1666.45 to SPARK from Agnes Bennett Fund.
- Youth Ministry Fund: A motion was made to put \$8000 of the Youth Ministry money into a CD as determined by Lee-Ann based on current rates.
- Boiler Loan: Balance \$19,088

Committee Reports

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- Anniversary Committee: Save the date postcards being readied to go out. The official letter and RSVP's will go out after July 4th. Ann is working on the history booklet. A selfie station will be made, and in lew of a gift to the congregation, a gift will be made to the ELCA good gifts in honor of Zion's 150th Anniversary.
- Property and Safety Committee: The hot water in the kitchen is working at this time and we will revisit if problems occur again. Mark Shallow will continue doing summer yard care. Mark will be getting an updated cost for Social Hall flooring from Maccos and HJ Martin. A permanent chancel ramp needs to be ADA compliant which means we need eighteen feet of space and will cost \$5000. No portable ramps are ADA compliant we will check with our insurance company to find out any liability issues if we go forward with a portable ramp.
- **Personnel:** Laura will be reaching out to Bishop Katherine on the protocol for the coterminous evaluation process.

Old Business

- Bell Project: No current update.
- **Synod Assembly Delegates:** Karen Sylvester and Carole Boerner will be our delegates for Assembly in May

New Business

- **Time and Talent Survey Results:** The council was encouraged to use the results to better serve the congregation.
- To God Be the Glory Praise and Worship Picnic: Laura mentioned this event will be held on September 6, 2025, in Wausaukee. More information will be coming.

The goal of Zion's Stewardship and Generosity Committee is to help God's people grow in their relationship with Jesus through the use of the time, talents, and finances God has entrusted to them.

Our focus in May is Invite. Zion's Vision Statement for "Invite" is: "In light of the many unique gifts that God has graciously entrusted to Zion, we envision a congregation that invites others to participate in the life of the congregation by training its members to actively encourage those who are not connected with a congregation to participate in what Jesus is doing through Zion, warmly welcoming them and enthusiastically involving them in the

mission work we do together as God's children."

I believe we can all agree that inviting others to come to an event is easy. You pick up the phone or send a text and ask them. Most of the time it doesn't take a lot of forethought. That cannot be said for inviting someone to attend a worship service. An astute person told me a few years ago, "Invitations are just the beginning of planning for an event...it should be the easiest part, but we often make inviting hard...there is always a fear of rejection for a variety of reasons...we should think of inviting someone to Zion as the easiest part...that's all we have to do... just invite and then Let Go and Let God!...the Holy Spirit does the rest of the work."

And so, it is with these sage words of advice that the Steward-ship and Generosity Committee, with the blessing of Pastor Amanda, is once again initiating Baptismal Anniversary recognitions for members beginning in June and continuing quarterly. There are few of us that can remember being baptized as we were usually less than a month or two old at the time. What is this thing called baptism, what does it mean, and why should I care?

mon. I honestly don't understand how I didn't make this connection before, but I confess ashamedly I didn't. As I listened, it occurred to me that what was being said about Jesus and Jesus' relationship to God, and how that relationship came to be, applied to me as well. This was my epiphany. Let me explain.

There is a huge gap in what we know about Jesus' life. He was born, at age 12 his parents thought him lost, but found him in the synagogue preaching, and still much later John the Baptist baptized him. It is at this point, where Jesus' ordinary life turned extraordinary. It is at this very point in his life, at his baptism, when God tells Jesus that he is his son. It is at this pivotal point where God tells Jesus that he is loved because of who he is and not what he has done or is about to do. He is loved simply because he is God's son.

Something clicked! My epiphany happened! I understood, even before the words were spoken, that the very same thing that happened to Jesus at his baptism happened to me – happened to you. We probably don't remember our baptism, but God does. Baptism is our pivotal point just as it was for Jesus. Like Jesus, we were declared children of God, the Holy Spirit took up residence within us, Heaven was open to us, and the love of God dwelt and still dwells within us each day. Yes, because God the Holy Spirit is within us right now, he lives every moment of our life with us, the good and bad, he is completely one with us. That Holy Spirit is supporting us and surrounding us with God's comfort.

Heaven is right here, right now, because we have God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirt. The next life will be very different to this one. God isn't at a distance with us until we die. No, he is right here with us... At our baptism God said he is well pleased with us simply because of 'who' we are. We are children of God, and he loves us.

event in our lives — our baptism. Galatians 5:22 tells us we are God's children gifted with the fruits of the Holy Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. In Holy Baptism the Triune God delivered us from evil, put our sinful self to death, gave us new birth, adopted us as children, and made us members of the body of Christ, the church. It is good that we should remember and recognize this life-changing experience yearly.

Dear Lord, many of us go through life not truly recognizing all that our baptism means. We know we are baptized and yet we don't often consider what that means. Our hope is that these quarterly recognitions of this life-changing event will help us to center on its importance in our life. Amen

Baptismal Affirmation

The ancient service of Holy Baptism that Luther translated from Latin also included a section in which the pastor meets the baptismal party at the door of the church and commands the devil to leave the child alone. This was not mere superstition but a clear confession by Luther of the evil in which we all live and of the power of God to use Holy Baptism and its promises to rescue us. Holy Baptism is central to our faith; it pronounces us children of God. For that reason, and in remembrance of all that our baptism means, a quarterly baptismal affirmation will be held on the first Sunday of the last month of each calendar quarter. The first affirmation will be held during the regular worship service on June 1st. For this first affirmation, those who have had a baptismal "birthday" in April, May, or June will be invited to approach the altar for a brief ceremony. The ceremony, led by Pastor Amanda, includes prayer, scripture reading, baptismal candle lighting, and laying on of hands. Coffee-hour fellowship will be held after the service.

May Collection

Zion is Called to Go Where Jesus Leads and our Social Ministry Committee is committed to showing our congregation ways to live out that calling in our community. During the month of May, we will be taking up a collection for Emergency Rescue Squad, Inc.



This month's collection will be different than usual. We will have a board with squares numbered 1-100. Each square will have one or more envelopes equaling the number of the square. For example, square #37 might have three envelopes: \$20, \$10 & \$7. You are invited to take an envelope and give that amount. Fill it with the amount indicated, include your name and/or envelope number and put it in the offering plate or mail it to Zion. You are most certainly welcome to take as many envelopes as you would like. If we fill all of the envelopes on the board we will be able to give a gift of \$5,050 to Emergency Rescue Squad next month.

On Sunday, April 27th we will have a guest speaker at Zion to tell us all about this organization of first responders. Please join us to learn about the important services they provide in Marinette and Menominee Counties.
