

Reflections

GOD'S CALL TO CARE FOR CREATION: ADVOCACY

It says in Genesis 2:15 The Lord God took the man and put him in
the garden of Eden to till it and keep it. God gave us this
wonderful earth and made us its stewards. Are we adequately
responding to the call to keep or nurture creation for future
generations?

I had the privilege of attending the 8th EcoFaith Summit at First Lutheran Church in Duluth, Minnesota on April 5, 2025. I was honored to be a co-presenter at one of the Summit's break-out sessions. During the break-out session I highlighted the Marquette-based InterFaith Water Stewards' actions to increase awareness of drinking water issues. And I talked about humankind's failure to answer God's call to care for creation and provided some real-world examples of neglect, especially regarding water resources. Finally, I provided examples of actions people can do to nurture the environment both individually and as a congregation.

Advocacy was a main theme throughout the day. After hearing the Summit's eloquent, inspirational, and informative keynote speakers, I quickly realized that I have not been adequately answering God's call and have not been an active enough advocate. Did you know that our Church, the ELCA encourages advocacy on a variety of social issues, including the environment? Information about environmental advocacy endeavors and what you can do is available at: https://www.elca.org/our-work/publicly-engaged-church/advocacy/environment. There is no better time than now to stand up and advocate for creation care!

Our Church also has strong social teachings about our need to answer God's call. The Social Statement Caring for Creation: Vision, Hope, and Justice, established in 1993, is as relevant today as it was 32 years ago. You can download it from:

For July, pastor made 12 home visits.

Confirmation



Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.

On January 29, 2009, Zion's congregation adopted a Vision Statement for its Seven Marks of Discipleship: Pray, Worship, Study, Invite, Encourage, Give, and Serve. We believed this vision was about God's dreams, desires, and aspirations of what could be.

We envisioned becoming a thriving, vibrant model of Lutheran ministry both within our community and the world. God's greatest gift to us was the waters of Holy Baptism where we became Jesus' disciples. He also gave us each other - a most precious gift, so that we could support and help each other grow in our faith practices through our everyday lives.

For September, the Stewardship and Generosity Committee's focus will be Worship. Zion adopted this Vision Statement for "Worship" - We envision a congregation that worships enthusiastically and is so hungry to praise and worship God that at least half of its baptized members are present for worship on a weekly basis. Sixteen years have now elapsed since the adoption of this Vision Statement. How do you feel we are doing as a congregation?

Matthew 18:20. For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them.

I have been told more than once that true worship cannot be done alone. Sure, we can set time aside to show our love, appreciation, and devotion to God, but we cannot truly worship alone; we were never meant to. Just look at the early church and their experience with faith and what God had done in their lives. They met daily, they ate together, and shared their experience regularly with one another, and even carried each other's burdens together. In worship, with and through others, we encounter God in our midst, hear his promises, experiences his grace in the sacraments, and support one another in this life. In worship, we meet God face to face through the presence of other congregants.

The early church certainly set an example for us, and yet, in many ways, we cannot imitate what they have shown us. But we can build up each other's Christian belief by sharing our own faith experiences. We can help to lessen someone's burden by supporting them, whether financially or physically assisting them with whatever might be needed. We can pray for them, the congregation, and Pastor Amanda as together we try to be faithful Christians.

Just like the early church, we need each other. We need to worship God together. For as we gather God is truly among us and in us.

Lord God, help us to prioritize/find time this month to truly worship you by attending worship services to feel refreshed, empowered, renewed, and carried through the days and weeks ahead. Amen

National Day of Remembrance for Indian Boarding Schools

On September 28, Native and non-Native people across the United States and Canada pause to remember that from the years 1819-1969, countless Indigenous children were taken from their homes and placed in boarding schools, operated either by the US government or as mission schools partially funded by the government, by various Christian denominations. One of the government funded mission schools was operated by the Norwegian Lutheran Church—a predecessor body to the ELCA—Bethany Indian Mission at Wittenberg, Wisconsin.

Indian children often were placed in schools far from their families and their tribes in an effort to assimilate them to the dominant culture. They were forced to have western haircuts, made to wear clothing unfamiliar to them, and forbidden to speak in their native language. They were made to learn the cultural and religious values of white settlers and were not allowed to engage in any of the ceremonial or religious practices of their elders. Unable to learn practices germane to their tribal way of life, like ricing, maple sugaring, hunting and fishing, they were instead taught how to sew, cook, clean, and work on farms, trained to be a kind of servant class in white United States.

The boarding school motto was "Kill the Indian and Save the Man (sic)."

Often, boarding schools were also places of strict discipline. Racism was endemic. Physical and sexual abuse were common. Many children tried to run away. Others died while at boarding schools. The burial sites of a large number of children still have not yet been identified.

In recent years, we've come to recognize that we, in the Christian church, either condoned or actively participated in operating these boarding schools, which have led to so much suffering. But in fact, the damage inflicted on our Indigenous neighbors because of the boarding schools is incalculable.

Generations have struggled to regain their sense of worth and identity as Native people. As they go about their healing, it is our calling as people of God to support them.

To that end, we will be observing Remembrance Day on Sunday, Sept. 28, by including prayers for the survivors and those who have gone missing in the worship liturgy and wearing orange. Walking With Our Indigenous Neighbors, a synod task force, is encouraging all congregations within the synod to participate in some fashion either that weekend or one near it.

Orange is the color of Remembrance Day. So you are invited to wear orange in solidarity with our Indigenous neighbors. Any orange top or shirt is just fine, or you can purchase t-shirts here: https://nabshc.myshopify.com/collections/day-of-remembrance-orange-t-shirts. They are specifically designed for this national recognition and support the ongoing work of the National Native American Boarding School Healing Coalition (NABS). "The first and only national organization whose purpose is to advocate on behalf of Native peoples impacted by U.S. Indian boarding school policies. We seek truth through education and research, justice through activism and policy advocacy, and healing through programs and traditional gatherings."

GreenTip

A new study published in Science shows a staggering loss in soil moisture, a result of climate change, prolonged droughts, and pervasive draining of land-based waters that eventually flow into the oceans. Research from the team of scientists worldwide, together with satellite observations from NASA's Gravity Recovery and Climate Experiment, found that from 1979 to 2016 the rate of dumping water into the oceans from terrestrial land storage was greater than the melting of Greenland, with the biggest drops in soil moisture occurring in large regions in East and Central Asia, Central Africa, and the Americas. The melting of glaciers and ice sheets, and water leaving the continents, together with prolonged droughts and climate change that prevent soil moisture from bouncing back, have long-term impacts on water availability affecting agriculture, ecosystems and human societies. Use your voice to support efforts to practice smarter and sustainable water resource management.
